A flagrant outrage was perpetrated at Hollywood, between Rathkeale and Adare, the seat of James Hewson, Esq. by a party of three men well armed, who entered his demesne in noon day, and proceeded at once towards the front of the house. Mrs. Hewson observed the fellows, and apprehending violence, got the hall door fastened just before they came up, and having been refused admittance, one of this daring party posted a notice on the door, threatening the life of Mr. Hewson. The fellows then turned off, and retraced their steps down the avenue, where they unfortunately met Mr. Hewson about half way, on his return home. The three ruffians rushed at the gentleman, and presenting their guns, commanded him to kneel down.—While in this position, with their guns close to his head and breast, they swore Mr. Hewson to dismiss his steward, without further parley, or they would give him the death of Mr. Dawson, (Rev. Charles Dawson, who was murdered about 15 years ago at Pallas-kenry). The faithful steward has since left Mr. Hewson's service, apprehensive of his own life, as well as to save his master from the consequence of such an atrocious menace.

Patrick O'Neill, a native of Bruff, died there on Saturday, and as appears by verdict of the inquest on Tuesday, for want of food, having been stinted to one meal per day for a fortnight before his death. In addition to this melancholy case we have to notice the death of Bridget Borrane, who also died at Bruff, on Monday, and at the inquest held next day it was distinctly found that the unfortunate creature fell a victim to starvation.

James Cusack, lodge-keeper at Corbally, was arrested on Thursday by Constable Hardy, for being implicated with John M'Carthy, the porter, in the extensive robbery of money and hardware goods from Mr. Alfred Allen's shop in Patrick-street. Upwards of £100 worth of value was traced to M'Carthy's former residence, Kilrush, and a hag of ironmongery was found in the garden adjoining Cusack's at Corbally.
