DEFINCE THE REALM ACT.

An important announcement relative to the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Act has been made by the competent military anthority for Ireland. Under date 25th February the order prehibiting the sale of arms, ammunition, and explosive substances has been withdrawn in so far as it applies to the sale of sporting cartridges containing shot of any size not exceeding No 2 shot, such as is ordinarily used for sporting guns in the United Kingdom.

FAMOUS RISH SOLDIER DEAD.

Friend and Lieutenant of General Gordon,

The "Times" says .- We regret to announce the death of Colonel Sir Charles Mocre Watson, friend and lieutenant of General Gordon, and the daring ceptor of the citadel of Cairo after the battle of Tel-el-Kebir. He was born in Dublin in 1844, devoted himself to submarine mining, and p epared a scheme of equipment for military by loons for the Ashanti war, which led later to the building of the first nulltary balloop. In his life of Major-General Sir C M Wilson he gives a re-soned defence of Wilson's conduct of the Gordon Kellef Expedition. Watson had been the last to see Gordon off from Cairo in January, 1884.
