Lieut. Kelvington, 64th, Aid-de-Camp to Major-General Napier, in this district, and whose promotion to a company we announced, was gazetted on Friday to the great satisfaction of his friends. Captain Kelvington will remain on the Staff.

Lieut. J. H. Cox, 75th, son of Colonel Cox, K.H., Quartermaster-General on the Staff in this district, is promoted to an Unattached Company.

Lieut. Bickerstaff, 64th, in this garrison, has exchanged to the Carabineers, and Capt. Lyttleton, 64th, to the Newfoundland Veteran Companies.

Captain Pratt commands the division of the 41st remaining in this garrison.

Captain Eman's company 41st arrived this day from Corofin, en route to Buttevant.

Castle-Connell is now occupied by Captain Lodder's company 59th; O'Brien's Bridge, by a detachment under Ensign Pedder, and Newport, by one under Lieut. Bushe, all of the 59th, in place of detachments of the 41st.

SUICIDE OF A SOLDIER—William Proverbs, private of the 41st Regt. belonging to Capt. Tuckey's company, which arrived here on Friday from Ennistymon, put a period to his existence, at his billet on Merchants-quay, on Sunday morning, by shooting himself through the head. It appears he had been in depressed spirits, and disturbed mind since the previous week, owing to the death of his wife in her confinement at Ennistymon, and to whom he was fondly attached.—The unfortunate man was frequently heard to say that "as his wife was gone, his soldiering was done," and the commission of the rash act, verified his intention. Having returned to his billet after Church parade (for which he was late) he loaded his firelock, placed the muzzle under his neck, took off his right boot, and pulling the trigger with his toe, the ball passed right through the roof of his skull, causing instantaneous death, and lodging in the ceiling. Deceased was a native of Derbyshire, a man of good character, and twelve years in the regiment. In the afternoon of Sunday, the body of deceased was removed to the Castle barracks, where an inquest was held on Monday evening, by Dr. Enright, coroner.—Verdict "shot himself while in a state of temporary insanity."

A company of the 88th under Capt. Johnson, has replaced the detachment of the 41st at Tarbert, and expect to move thence to Newcastle.

Barracks have been provided in Tarbert for 140 men, and approved of. The troops heretofore detached in Listowel and Glin are to be concentrated in Tarbert, which is to be the only military station in that district.
