DEATH OF MR. M. J. DeCOURCY, SOLR.

We regret extremely to record the death of a member of an old Limerick family, Mr. M. J. DeCourcy, solicitor and city coroner, which took place at his residence, Henry Street, on Sunday. The deceased gentleman had been in failing health for some time past, and his demise was not unexpected. Mr. DeCourcy was a highly respected and esteemed citizen; of an ever courteous, kindly, and unassuming disposition, he was highly popular whether in public or private life. He was Coroner for the city for more than 40 years, the duties of which office he discharged with dignity and with that sympathy which was characteristic of him. Another important position he held was Secretary of the Corporation Water Works, to which he was appointed in 1885, previous to which he practised as a Solicitor in this city. Mr. DeCourcy's death at the age of 68 years is very sincerely regretted, by a wide circle of friends who deeply sympathise with his widow and family in their affliction.

The Funeral.

The funeral took place this morning from St. Michael's R.C. Church, whither the remains were transferred last night from Henry-street. The cortege, which was of considerable proportions, embraced the members of the Corporation, who walked behind the chief mourners, while the end was brought up by a large detachment of the R.C., under District Inspector White.
