

Collector Troy has received orders from the Commissioners of Customs, to compel all vessels arriving for orders at Cove, and remaining 24 hours, to report to the Custom House.

At the Police-office, this day, five drunkards were fined 5s. each; two pickpockets were committed to gaol, and informations were ordered against three vagrants for stealing potatoes.

Ellen Lee, *alias* Larkin, died suddenly in the English-town, on Thursday night. She had been amusing herself at a dance a few hours previous to her dissolution.

Thomas Magrath, a cooper, from John-street, died suddenly last night at Lynch's public-house, Mount-kennett, while drinking a glass of punch.

John Mitchel, a countryman, from Pallaskenry, threw himself into the Canal this morning, with the intent to destroy himself, but was rescued by some humane persons.

Captain John Carden, of Barnane, Templemore, in a letter to the *London Times*, pronounces to be false and calumnious the letter of their Thurles correspondent, stating that the magistrates of Tipperary are so incompetent for their duties that paid officers of Government now discharge those duties for them.

Lifford-house, late a Nunnery, near Ennis, is about to be taken for an additional workhouse, at £200.

The cost to the country for Captain Wynn's case and the Ennistymon guardians amounts to £1797.

The passenger car fare from Castlebar to Westport is reduced from 1s to 6d.

There are 100 labourers employed on the new canal from Lough Corrib to Lough Mask.

There are 300 men employed at Kilbeggan, deepening the river Brosna, between Ballinagree mills and Belvidere lake, the favorite resort of anglers.

At Shinrone Petty Sessions a summons was issued at the suit of Sandford Palmer, Esq. J. P. against Edward Murray, for killing partridges. Mr. Palmer was called but did not appear. The bench having read the statute made an order for 20s. costs against the complainant.

A few nights since an English gentleman was robbed in Cork of three £5 Bank of England notes.

Philip Fitzpatrick was hanged at Armagh gaol, on Saturday, for the murder of John and Wm. Henderson, brothers, at Lurgan, by stabbing them with a knife.

John Hyland a native of Westmeath, was blown to pieces by an explosion of rock and gun-powder at the York and Albany railroad last month. The contractor gave Hyland's widow the house in which he resided and the labourers subscribed 150 dollars for her.

At the recent Bandon Agricultural and Flax meeting, Mr. McKenna stated that he bought £500 worth of flax in the Limerick market, and took it to Belfast where he got double his money for it.

The Agent of the British Association in Dublin, has sent to the Government Inspector in Mayo, a large supply of turnip seed, &c. to be sown in ground from which potatoes have been dug under the blight.

The streets of Tralee were swept on Monday and Tuesday, by the vast inundation from the late heavy rains, and the floods covered all the ground floors of the houses. Several pigs and dogs were drowned in the rush of the torrent.
