On the 4th inst. at Rathmines, Stephen Blake, Esq. Paymaster 93d Regt. and formerly Lieut. 37th Regt.—very much regretted.

Wednesday last, at his house in Ennis, the Very Rev. Terence O'Shaughnessy, Dean of Killaloe, and Parish Priest, of Ennis and Dromcliffe, aged 85 years. This venerable Dignitary of the Roman Catholic Church devoted 14 years of his early life to study in the University of Louis the 14th, at Paris, and was a witness in that capital to all the horrors of the first French revolution. He attended King Louis 16th at his execution; after which the devoted and courageous Ecclesiastic returned to Ireland to pursue the mission in his native country. He was, after the usual local probation, appointed Parish Priest of Killaloe, where he ministered to his flock with pious zeal, and for near 30 years has been the Parish Priest of Ennis and Dean of Killaloe. Most hospitable in his domestic establishment—the friend, the acquaintance, or the stranger, found a cordial welcome at his board; and the relief he dispensed to the poor and helpless often exceeded the resources at his command. No Clergyman in the Church laboured more assiduously during the fatal ravages of cholera in 1832, amongst the poor of Ennis, whom he attended day and night, regardless of all personal risk, and prepared for every sacrifice at the instance of duty and humanity. Dean O'Shaughnessy built the beautiful Chapel of Ennis, so ornamental to that town, and always devoted himself to promote the moral and religious instruction of his numerous flock. The venerable Dignitary was long distinguished for his courtly manners and truly dignified appearance. He possessed great and deserved influence with Protestants and Roman Catholics, and his death will be long regretted by all classes of persons.
