

...for the purpose of taxation, are entitled to set the poor rate from their amount. We should have an equitable right to do so, but we need as yet there is no legal authority.

GOOD EXAMPLE.—Thomas Arthur, Esq. the chief magistrate in Killokenedy parish, has never deducted anything from the resident clergyman of Doonass. Messrs O'Brien and Sir Hugh Dillon Massey consistently observe the same rule by the resident pastors of their respective estates.

HORRIBLE EFFECTS OF DESTITUTION.

The townland of Doora, near Ennis, four deaths occurred in one house from starvation under circumstances of the most horrid nature. It appears that two families of the name of Linnane and Quin were living in the same cabin. Linnane, the father of one of the families, is undergoing imprisonment in Ennis for sheep stealing. He held two acres of land, on which there was a small quantity of potatoes. Previous to harvest this family having no means of support went into the workhouse; but left it shortly afterwards that they might use the potatoes which they had stored up. After these were consumed, the father died of starvation, which was the immediate cause of the events which followed. The other family named Quin, who resided in the same cabin, were obtaining one meal per week, which they divided with Linnane's family. One of the Quin's took fever, and was removed to hospital, half a stone of the quantity of meal was stopped from the family, and after recovering, and again joining the family, their numbers were not increased, and thus nine individuals (which the two families consisted) were left solely dependent on one stone of meal per week; and were in the habit of gathering turnip tops or anything to add to their scanty fare! The consequence was that on the 16th inst. one of the children, Susan Linnane, died and was buried by the others in the garden adjoining the house. Bridget Quin died on the 16th, Mary Quin on the 17th, and Mary Linnane (the mother) on the 20th; these three corpses remained lying in the house until the surviving children until the 24th inst. when the shocking condition of the family was discovered, and on approaching to the door of the cabin the stench proceeding from it was so great as to render it impossible to enter until a small window in the back part of the cabin was broken open to allow a current of air to pass through it. When the remaining members of the family made their appearance outside, they presented such a horrible spectacle that it would be in vain to attempt a description of it. On entering the cabin it was found that part of one of the corpses had been eaten by rats.

An inquest was subsequently held on the bodies by Mr. Martin, coroner: In the cases of Bridget and Mary Quin, the following verdict was returned:—"That the deceased, Bridget Quin and Mary Quin, came by their deaths from want and destitution, and we believe the relieving Officer, James Lynch, guilty of neglect of duty in having refused to give back to this family the remainder of the rations which were stopped on one of them going to the hospital, and although seven weeks had elapsed, said James Lynch has not increased the quantity. We also think said James Lynch guilty of neglect in not having gone to see this family when called on." In the cases of Susan and Mary Linnane the verdict was, that "deceased had died from starvation and want."

The Sub-Inspector of Police, H. G. Kelly, Esq., has made a special report on the subject to the Castle.

Margaret Farrell, died of cholera, the first marked case, on board the convict ship Cadet, at Plymouth, on Friday last.
