Two More Limerick Goldsmiths

In the 1991 volume of this journal the late Larry Walsh published a note¹ identifying two previously unrecorded Limerick silversmiths, John and Philip Lyles, and their names figure in the comprehensive list of silversmiths compiled by John McCormack & Conor O'Brien in the catalogue for a major exhibition of silver at the Hunt Museum in 2007,² where further information is provided. It is suggested that Lyles and other variants of the name are anglicised versions of the Gaelic name *Laighléis* and that they were members of a surviving hereditary Gaelic family of goldsmiths in the early seventeenth century. It is now possible to add a further two names to that list. A grant of English liberty dated 1559 from Queen Elizabeth³ lists, among others, Gilladuffe O'Cowltayn and Donald son of Edmund Mecgyllsaghta, as goldsmiths. If Donald followed his father's trade then we have a third name.
