

IN the compilation of the Directory, now submitted to the public of Ireland, the Proprietors and their agents have experienced many unexpected difficulties, and on that account have to apologize for the delay in its publication. They have been anxious to compress into this volume all the information possible, and have given a directory of more than two hundred and twenty Cities and Towns, being nearly sixty more than they submitted to the public in their printed proposals.

Into a work of this kind, notwithstanding the most vigilant attention, errors will make their way, but it is hoped that their number will appear small, when the magnitude of the work, and the difficulties inseparable from so extensive an undertaking are considered.

This portion of the united kingdoms has been comparatively little visited by strangers, and little is known of its internal affairs, except through the medium of the public prints; in the present volume will be found, at the head of each City and Town, an historical and descriptive account, in which is inserted all the general information, that a due regard to brevity would allow. This is followed by Lists of the Nobility, Gentry and Clergy, of the Merchants, Manufacturers, Traders, &c., with the calling and residence of each individual attached; the public conveyances, both by land and by water, have also been particularly attended to; and there is added an alphabetical reference to all the Nobility, Gentry and Clergy of Ireland, besides a list of those resident in Dublin.

Respecting the beauty of the type, the neatness of the execution, and the goodness of the paper, little needs be said, as they speak for themselves; and, in these respects, the proprietors can with confidence put it in competition with any work of the kind ever published. The Maps of Ireland and of England have been engraved under their own immediate superintendence, and they have no doubt of their having been neatly and correctly executed.

In giving the very copious Directory of London, with those of Birmingham, Bristol, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester and Sheffield, the promise which was made has been redeemed; and in presenting a copious historical and directorial account of the Isle of Man, a work of supererogation has been performed, which, it is hoped, will be gratifying to their friends, and be a convincing proof of their anxiety to serve the public. This island, situated nearly in the centre of the Irish Sea, has lately become a place of very fashionable resort, and the information given will not be unacceptable to those, who may intend to visit its shores.

The publishers cannot conclude this address without rendering their grateful acknowledgments to several gentlemen, who have generously forwarded their views, and rendered them other essential services. If the present undertaking should give that satisfaction, which the extensive list of subscribers gives reason to anticipate, and if, at a future period, an enlarged edition should be called for, the compilers will cheerfully renew their labours, and endeavour to keep pace with the increased expectations of the public.

of money on security, the same being refunded by weekly instalments of one shilling in the pound. A charitable society has an establishment for the distribution of flax, wheels, &c. which is the source of infinite benefit to the labouring classes; it is supported by subscriptions. The county infirmary is an ornament to the town, and the new court house and prison under one roof is a handsome stone building, eligibly situated on the Green; it was erected in 1818. Cashel contains a barrack for two companies of foot, and a handsome market house, both situated in the Main-street. The archbishop's palace is a spacious structure situated in the centre of the town, and the gardens attached to it extend to the foot of the rock. This is a very ancient episcopal city to which the bishopric of Emly is united; it was either founded or restored at the beginning of the 10th century; the ruins of the old cathedral testify its having been an extensive as well as handsome structure, boldly towering on the celebrated rock of Cashel. Adjoining the cathedral are the ruins of Cormac's chapel, built

in 901 by Cormac Mac Culinan, at once king and archbishop of Cashel, who, it is supposed, erected the round tower, which stands upon the top of the rock. This is by some considered to have been the first stone building in Ireland, but it is doubtful if there are not earlier evidences of masonry in this kingdom; it seems to have been copied after the Grecian architecture, and long to have preceded that, which is usually called Gothic. The tower is lofty and defied the too successful attempts of archbishop Price, who, in the present century, unroofed, and thereby demolished, the ancient and venerable cathedral, which had been erected by St. Patrick. On the ascent to the cathedral is a stone, on which, according to tradition, the kings here were crowned; for this was formerly the royal seat and metropolis of the kings of Munster. Cashel is under the patronage of Richard Pennefather, Esq. The fairs are on the 26th of March and 7th of August. The market-days are Wednesday and Saturday.—The population is estimated at about 5000.

CASTLE-CONNELL

IN the county of Limerick, is a neat village on the
banks of the river Shannon; it is situated two miles
to the left of the mail road from Limerick to Dublin,
at a distance of six miles from the former place, and
90 from the latter. It possesses a neat church, and
contains the ruins of a very ancient castle, formerly

one of the strong holds of the O'Briens. About two
miles from this place is O'Brien's bridge, a very sin-
gular structure of 14 arches, no two of which are
turned alike. Castle Connell is the residence of the
Earl of Clare who possesses a spacious domain, in
the neighbourhood; it is also the seat of Lord Massy.

CASTLE-LYONS,

ANCIENTLY called Castle Lehan, from the
O'Lehans, an ancient Irish Sept, is in the county of
Cork, and distant from Dublin 111 miles, nearly south
west, and 15 north by east of Cork. It is a neat small
town, pleasantly situated in a fertile valley, near the

river Bride. The ruins of an old abbey of Franciscans,
founded in 1307, are still to be seen. On its disso-
lution it was granted to the Earl of Cork, who as-
signed it to his son-in-law, David, first Earl of Bar-
rymore. On the ruins of O'Leahan's Castle stood the

CHARLEVILLE,

IS a large and highly respectable market town, distant 112 miles south west of Dublin, 30 north of Cork, 20 south of Limerick, 14 north of Mallow, and 58 north east of Killarney, by Macroom. It is pleasantly situated on the confines of the county of Cork, and owes its establishment to Roger, first Earl of Orrery, and Lord President of Munster, who held his court here, and bestowed on its improvement a portion of that munificence, for which the noble family of Boyle has been eminently distinguished. Among other spirited acts, was the liberal endowment of a free school, and a charter school. It was a corporate town, governed by a sovereign, two bailiffs, and twelve burgesses, and, until the union, returned two members to Parliament. Here is a court for the recovery of debts to the amount of one hundred pounds and upwards, and there are weekly petty sessions. The situation of the town was well chosen, as it stands on the great road leading from Cork to Limerick, in a very rich and fertile country, and possesses the advantage of being well supplied with

water: its greatest want is that of fuel, which was probably little felt at the time of its establishment, when wood was in sufficient abundance. Charleville, however, under the disadvantage above mentioned, has been lately much improved; the markets are excellent, and the town is well furnished with good shops, for the supply of the adjacent country, as well as the inhabitants, among whom are many opulent residents. The church is a plain structure; the Catholic chapel a new, spacious and commodious building. The market is held on Saturday, and fairs on the 10th of October, and the 12th of November. At the distance of six miles from Charleville, on the road to Mallow, is situate the ancient town of Buttevant, formerly a place of very great note: its present wretchedness exhibits some vestiges of its religious buildings, now nothing more than a heap of ruins. The castle has been repaired by its present owner, Sir John Anderson, and is become an elegant and respectable mansion.

KILLARNEY,

A MARKET, post and fair town in the county of Kerry, distant 143 miles south-west of Dublin, 45 west by north of Cork, 16 south-east of Tralee, 31 east by south of Dingle, and 28 south of Listowel, and situated in the barony of Magunihy, is a handsome, well paved, thriving town, and during the summer is the resort of a great assemblage of visitors, who come from all quarters to view the unrivalled scenery of its romantic lakes. The Church consists of one aisle, has some handsome monuments, and a painting on glass in the eastern window. Though the exterior is contradictory to all rules of architecture, it has, nevertheless, a very venerable and interesting appearance. The Roman Catholic chapel is a handsome building in the New-street, and beside it is the residence of the Right Rev. Charles Sugrue, the titular bishop; in the same street there is a presentation convent, in which is held a free school for educating female children. The Earl of Kenmare allows the convent one hundred pounds a year, and clothes 30 of the girls; he also clothes and apprentices 20 boys out of another school, which is under the patronage of the Catholic bishop. A Protestant free school has been lately erected, and will be supported by the annual subscriptions of the Protestant gentry. Quarter sessions are held here, as well as a manor court once a month for the recovery of debts under 40 shillings. The town has three club and reading rooms. About two miles distant,

on the way to Mangerton Mountain, Ivrelagh, or Mucruss abbey, rears its venerable head amidst lofty limes and ashes: it was founded by Donald M'Carthy in 1440 for conventual Franciscans, and has since been the cemetery of the M'Carthys. Donald, Earl of Clancare, and his nephew Patrick Lord Kerry were entombed here in 1600. The choir contains several monuments with inscriptions, and on a large white stone are the armorial bearings of the M'Carthy Mores. The cloister is in a very perfect state, in the centre of which stands an immense yew, whose stem rises perpendicularly upwards of 30 feet, and its spreading branches, like an immense umbrella, overshadow the whole cloister, so as to form a gloomy canopy. On the road to Castlemain are the ruins of Aghadoe, an ancient episcopal see, united to Limerick in 1663, and near it the remains of a round tower. Dunloe castle, which formerly belonged to the O'Sullivans, now the seat of Major Mahony, is situated on the extremity of the lower lake. On the other side of the river may be seen all that remains of a noble residence of the M'Carthy Mores. Ross castle, built by the family of O'Donnoghue Ross, and situated on Ross Island, was dismantled by General Ludlow in 1652, to whom it was surrendered by Lord Muskerry. Saturday is the market-day, and fairs are held on the 1st of July and the 11th of November.

KILRUSH

IN the county of Clare, is distant one hundred and thirty-six miles south-west of Dublin, ninety two north-west of Cork, forty-two west of Limerick, eighteen south-west of Ennis, and fourteen south of Milltown. It is a small modern town on the banks of the river Shannon, and its harbour is excellent, possessing every local advantage at a distance of about fourteen miles from the sea. The church is a neat structure, and the Roman Catholic chapel is a large substantial building. Here is also a chapel for Protestant dissenters. The establishment of most notice, is the Kilrush Bathing Hotel, which, for situation, elegance and accommodation, may vie with any in this or the sister kingdom. The market house is situated in the centre of the town, and adds much to its appearance. The court house is an ancient unadorned building, in which are held the sessions in May and October, and the petty sessions once a week. The market is well supplied on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Fairs are held on the 10th of May, and the 12th of October.

the Irish fought gallantly, and repulsed the English several times; but the garrison was grown weary of the war, and on the 23d of September, 1691, when they had fired a long time from their batteries with uncommon violence, they concluded the day with beating a parley, when a cessation of hostilities was agreed on, and an amicable intercourse opened between the two contending parties; the result was, that the Irish war was declared at an end, and King William became master of the kingdom. To perpetuate the memory of the surrender of Limerick, a medal was struck, on the obverse of which was the Latin inscription, *Non hæc sine numine Divum*, (these things are due to propitious heaven) and on the reverse, *Limerica capta, Hibernia subacta, Octob. 1691*, (Limerick taken and Ireland subdued, October, 1691). This city is now composed of three parts, named the Irish Town, English Town, (the latter situated on an island formed by the river Shannon) and Newtown-Perry, which may, with great propriety, be termed the court end, as in this quarter of the town the streets are spacious, uniform and elegant, intersecting each other at right angles, and the houses are finished in the neatest style of modern architecture. This portion of the city was erected by the exertions of the late Lord Perry, whose name it bears, and its superior advantages and conveniences render it the fashionable as well as favourite residence of opulence. Limerick is an episcopal see, and was united to Ardfert and Aghadoe, in the county of Kerry, in 1663. It gives the title of Earl to Edmund Henry Perry, nephew to the late Lord Perry. The municipal government is vested in a mayor, recorder, sheriffs, aldermen and burgesses, who compose the common council; a burgess must serve the office of mayor here, before he is elected an alderman, which is the reverse in Dublin and other towns. There are also six justices of the peace, appointed by charter, who are the present and late mayor, the recorder and three aldermen: a military governor, and a town major are likewise on the establishment, who regulate all local military transactions. Newtown-Perry obtained an Act of Parliament, a few years since, for its separate management, which is regulated by 21 commissioners, (seven of whom are elected every two years) who are authorised to levy rates for paving, watching, lighting and cleansing the parish, which in every respect appears to be most judiciously carried into execution, reflects the highest credit on the exertions of those to whom the arrangements are entrusted, and the effects of which give this handsome portion of the city a spirited metropolitan appearance. The streets in the old town are narrow and gloomy, an inconvenience always observable in fortified places, where personal security engrossed the entire attention of the founders. The public edifices here are handsome and commodious. The Custom House is an elegant building of hewn stone; its front is embellished with fluted pilasters and capitals, and on each side is a piazza. The new Court House is also a spacious noble building, with a handsome portico in front. The Commercial buildings, situated in Rutland-street, are large, elegant, and in the neatest style of modern architecture. They evince a spirited display of public taste, and are a great embellishment to the city. In this structure, the chamber of commerce is established, which was incorporated by charter in 1815, but was first instituted in the year 1807; it is governed by a committee of nine directors, annually chosen. The Exchange, which was built in the year 1778, is an extensive handsome erection, in which is a spacious council chamber; the building is supported by seven stone columns, in the Tuscan order. The Linen Hall is also a neat commodious building. A new County Gaol has been built within these few years, which is generally considered to be the most complete prison in Ireland. It consists of a large centre, containing the governor's apartments, a dispensary, a chapel, a committee room, and five detached prisons, each communicating with the chapel on the second floor, by ornamented cast iron bridges; belonging to each compartment of the prison are two

fine airy yards, the whole of which are overlooked, from the centre building. The interior contains 103 cells for criminals, 5 solitary cells, and 22 rooms for debtors. The whole is constructed of lime stone, was begun to be erected in 1816, and finished in 1822. The County Infirmary is also a spacious structure, facing the gaol. The internal management of this praiseworthy institution does honour to those to whom it is confided. The churches in Limerick are not remarkable for external beauty. St. Mary's, or the cathedral, is entirely of the ancient Gothic, and may be admired for its noble simplicity. There are seventeen arches in the aisles and choir, besides the great eastern window, under which the high altar was placed before the reformation. Besides this there are three other churches and a chapel of ease, four Roman Catholic chapels, three friaries, and a nunnery. One of these, called the Dominican Convent and Chapel, is deserving of notice. It is a very handsome building, in the Gothic style, and was erected by the exertions of the Rev. Joseph Harrigan, then Prior, in the year 1815. The Augustinian Chapel George's-street, was the late theatre, and cost, a few years ago, 4,000*l*. The interior is very elegantly embellished for a place of worship, and a fine scriptural painting adorns the altar; it has also an organ in the gallery, facing the altar. The Independent meeting house is a large handsome building, in Bedford-row, and in Upper Glentworth-street is situated the Presbyterian place of worship, which is small, but remarkably neat. The Primitive Methodist chapel is in the same street with the Independent, and is a very large respectable erection, and in every way adapted for a numerous congregation. The Wesleyan chapel, in George's-street, is also a commodious place of worship. The Quakers have a meeting house in Cecil-street. The charitable institutions in Limerick are numerous and extremely well conducted, particularly in the medical and surgical departments. The Infirmary, Fever and Lock Hospitals, the Magdalen Asylum, and Foundling Hospital are prominent features of benevolence. The House of Industry, which is a fine spacious building, on the North Strand, is an establishment of the first consideration, as it relieves the mind and sight from the wretched objects that would otherwise infest the streets; and this institution deserves to be supported to the extent of the ability of every inhabitant of the city. A Lunatic Asylum is now erecting, near the new county gaol, which, when finished, will be a very handsome and spacious building. This city also abounds in institutions for the instruction of the poor, and the assistance of the unfortunate. The charity schools consist of the Blue Coat School, in Bow-lane; a Boys' and Girls' School, in Michael-street; and one for Protestant Orphan Girls, in George's-street; a Catholic Free School, conducted by four masters, called the Christian Brothers, in Clare-street; and one for Female Orphans of the same persuasion, in Denmark-street. At the Nunnery, in Barrack-street, is also an extensive Female Charity School, under the inspection and tuition of the nuns. There are, besides, several other establishments for the mental improvement of both Protestant and Catholic poor children, which are all well organized and regularly conducted. Here are also two Charitable Loan Societies, one called Perry's, and the other Jubilee, which render pecuniary aid to poor tradesmen and others, who can be well recommended. The mercantile trade of Limerick is considerable, particularly the exports. These were, in the last year, ending the 1st September, 1823, 2,366 tierces and 290 barrels of beef; 3,627 tierces and 9000 barrels of pork; 54,473 firkins of butter; 4,316 bales of bacon; 92,753 barrels of wheat; 2,545 barrels of barley; 172,290 barrels of oats; 10,045 barrels of rape seed; the estimated value of which was 500,000*l*. The imports consist of tea, sugar, wine, salt, &c. at an annual value of about 300,000*l*. Some linens and woollens are manufactured here, and the domestic trade of the city, which is carried on by the shopkeepers and retailers of the most fashionable articles of dress, and

other necessities and luxuries of life, is to a very great extent. The commercial transactions are greatly assisted by the Chamber of Commerce, an association of merchants, formed in the year 1807, and incorporated by charter in the year 1815, which is governed by a committee of nine directors, chosen annually. The river Shannon is navigable for vessels of 500 tons burthen, from the quay of Limerick to the sea a distance of 60 miles. About a mile distant from the city the vessels anchor, in the Pool, from which is a most delightful view, very deservedly admired by foreigners and strangers. On one side is seen the new town, with the Bishop's and Sir Henry Harlston's gardens close to the river, and on the other side a number of villas, belonging to the citizens, and a full front view of the city combine a most interesting panoramic prospect. Limerick is a city and county of itself, and sends one member to Parliament; the present member is Thomas Spring Rice, Esq. The Honbl. Colonel Fitzgibbon, of Mount Shannon, near Limerick, and Captain O'Grady, of Rockbarton, are the county members. The garrison is extensive, and consists of 71 officers and 1459 men of the line. The new barrack and artillery barrack are built upon the most approved modern plan, and are situated in a fine open airy place, well adapted for the purpose. Many traces of antiquity and feudal warfare are discernible in and about this city, particularly at the Fever Hospital, which is situated on a spot remarkable as being the site of the castle or batteries, which held out so long a siege against the forces of Cromwell. The bastion is still tolerably perfect, where the females of Limerick so heroically assisted in the defence of their husbands and friends; the breach, that was made in the walls by the besiegers, is yet distinctly very visible; the portcullis and walls throughout bear evident marks of the impression made by the balls of the enemy. The most correct idea of this city, as to its scale, when enclosed with walls and fortifications, may be formed by a comparison of its then contracted state with its present extent, population and magnificence, as no town in the kingdom has so much increased in size and splendour, in the short space of 25 years, as the city of Limerick; and its improvement is still progressive. An Act has lately passed, empowering 58 commissioners and directors to erect a splendid new

bridge over the Shannon from the New Town to the county of Clare; it is intended to be named after the present Lord Lieutenant; the building of the bridge has already commenced, towards the completion of which government has granted 60,000*l*. It is supposed it will be finished in about three years; Alexander Nimmo, esq. is the projector and chief engineer. There is also an extensive elegant building erecting near the new county gaol, for a lunatic asylum, which, when finished, will be a great ornament to the entrance of the city on the Cork road. A large structure is also about to be erected for a diocesan school, for Limerick, Killaloe, and Killenora, where the best masters are intended to be employed, for the purpose of dispensing education to the higher and middle classes, at a moderate expense. It is also in agitation immediately to light the city with gas, and it is hoped that good water, of which at present there is a great deficiency, will soon be brought into it by pipes. Two steam boats are intended to be soon established, on the canal between Limerick and Dublin, by which means a communication will be formed with the Liverpool and Dublin steam luggage boat, when goods may then be had from Manchester and Liverpool in the short time of about four days. The market is well supplied with all the necessities of life, and at reasonable prices; the market days are Wednesdays and Saturdays. Here are four yearly fairs, viz. on Easter Tuesday, the 4th of July, the 4th of August, and the 12th of December; there is a privilege annexed to the fair held in this city on the 4th of August, that no person can be arrested within the precincts of the liberties, on any process issuing out of the tholsel court of Limerick, for the space of fifteen days, an immunity which is cheerfully enjoyed by many unfortunate debtors. The population, according to the last census, was 66,042; but from the difficulty experienced by those appointed to collect the number of inhabitants, it is generally supposed that this return is at least ten or fifteen thousand short of the actual number; and, when the great extent of Limerick is considered, being at least three miles in circumference, and densely inhabited, it may be readily supposed, that there is a population of nearly 80,000 in this flourishing and increasing city.

The Waterford mail arrives at a quarter past four in the afternoon, and is despatched at a quarter before seven, taking the letters for Pallis-Grane, Tipperary, Cahir, Clonmel, Carrick-on-Suir, &c. The Tralee mail arrives at ten in the morning, and is despatched at half past eleven in the morning, taking the letters for Adair, Rathkeale, Askeaton, Listowel, Tarbut, Pallis-Kenry, Newcastle, Dingle, &c. The Ennis mail arrives every morning at ten o'clock, and is despatched at half past eleven the same morning, taking the letters for Six-Mile-Bridge, New Market-on-Fergus, Galway, Currofin, Kildysart, Kilrush, Knock, &c.—The Post Office is open daily from nine in the morning until eight in the evening.

of the square a tower was erected. The manor of Lismore castle was granted by Myler Magrath, archbishop of Cashel, and bishop of Lismore, to Sir Walter Raleigh, at whose death it was forfeited, and purchased by Sir Richard Boyle, who highly embellished the original edifice by many considerable additions and improvements, all of which suffered in the exterminating fury of the rebellion in the year 1641. In 1785, the Duke of Rutland, then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, in the course of a tour through Munster, held a council in this castle, and issued proclamations. This castle is also celebrated as the birth-place of Boyle the philosopher, and, it is said, of Congreve the poet. This magnificent pile,

and Saturdays. Fairs are held on the 3rd of May, the
20th of August, and the 1st of October. The popu-
lation is estimated at nearly 4000.

ROSCREA

Is an ancient town on the borders of the King's and Queen's Counties, in the county of Tipperary, 59 miles S. W. of Dublin, 40 N. of Clonmel, and 35 N.E. of Limerick. It was erected into a bishoprick in the year 620, by St. Cronan; but in the twelfth century was united to Killaloe. Some remains of the Cathedral may be seen in the west front of the old church, executed in the beautiful style of the ninth century. Near it is a large stone cross, called the Shrine of St. Cronan, as well as one of the largest round towers in the kingdom, built of square stones, and in excellent preservation. Near this town the Danes met their first signal defeat; they had marched from Limerick and Connaught to surprise the inha-

bitants, then assembled at the great annual fair of Roscrea, which held fourteen days; but the people had notice of their approach, marched out to oppose them, and gave them so great an overthrow, that 4000 Danes lay dead in the field, amongst whom was Olfm, their chief. In 1213 King John erected a large castle here, (being the bounds of the English pale) as a protection against the incursions of the natives. Roscrea is now a thriving trading town; it has a barrack for a regiment of foot, a large new church, built in 1812 in the Gothic style, a Roman Catholic chapel, two Methodist chapels, a Quakers' meeting house, a bridewell, a free school, public shambles and market house, where a manor court is held
