## HOUSES OF WORSHIP.

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*St. Mary's Cathedral*, Mary-street, was founded about the year 1180, by Donald O'Brien, King of Limerick, on the site of his own Palace. It was much enlarged by Bishop Donat O'Brien, in the 13th Century, and much money was laid out in its repairs, by the subsequent Bishops and the Citizens of Limerick. In 1752, about a £1400 was laid out for the improvement of this Church under the superintendence of the Rev. D. Hoare, and in 1832-34 a further sum of nearly 3000*l.* was expended in the enlargement of the body of the Church, fitting up a new Organ, and various repairs and improvements. From the Communion table to the west door, measures 156 feet, and from the north to the south 114 feet. The Steeple is 120 feet high, and contains eight bells. In the Church are several handsome Monuments, particularly one erected to the memory of the late Lord Bishop, Dr. Jebb, by subscriptions from the Friends of Literature, in England, Ireland and America. It is made of white marble, and represents his Lordship sitting on a chair, enrobed, with a book in his hand; it cost over £1100. There are two services in this Church on Sunday, at 11 and 3 o'Clock; and three on the week days. The Very Rev. Dean Preston, Rector, Rev. H. Gubbins, Curate. Sermons are Preached on Sunday mornings, by the Ven. Arch. Forster, Preacher to the Cathedral; and by the members of the Chapter, (who also arrange all the Temporalities,) viz. The Hon. and Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Limerick, Prebendary of Athnett; the Very Rev. Arthur Preston, Dean of Limerick; the Ven. William Wray Maunsell, Archdeacon; Rev. John Warburton, Precentor; Rev. Charles Warburton, Chancellor; Rev. Thomas Quin, Treasurer; Rev. John Duddell, Prebendary of St. Munchin; Rev. John Jebb, Prebendary of Donoughmore; Rev. Edward Nash, Prebendary of Ballycane; Rev. Edward Herbert, Prebendary of Kilpeacon; Rev. Edward Gerahty, Prebendary of Killeedy; Rev. William

Massy, Prebendary of Dysart; Rev. Samuel Jones, Prebendary of Ardcanny; Rev. ———— Prebendary of Effin; Rev. William Ash, Prebendary of Croagh; Rev. J. Fitzgerald, Prebendary of Tullybrackey. The Sunday evening Sermons are generally preached by the Rev. H. Gubbins. Morning Prayers are read in turn by the six Minor Canons, viz. Rev. Thomas Willis, Ven. Dr. Forster, Rev. Henry Gubbins, Rev. William Lewis, Rev. John Croker, and Rev. Austin Martin.

*St. Munchin's Church* at the upper end of Nicholas-street, near the Island, is said to have been founded in the seventh Century, by St. Munchin, the first Bishop of Limerick. After the conversion of the Danes to Christianity it was rebuilt and continued to be the Cathedral of Limerick until the 12th Century. In 1711, the Church received some additions and repairs under the superintendence of Bishop Smyth, and further improvements by the exertions of his family in 1752. It being found necessary to rebuild this church, the Rev. John Duddell obtained a grant from the Board of First Fruits, by which, with voluntary contributions received through his exertions from the citizens of Limerick, the new structure was finished in 1827. It is faced with cut stone, overhangs the river Shannon, and commands a fine view of the county Clare mountains. Divine service is performed twice on Sundays, at 11 and 3 o'Clock, and on Wednesdays and Fridays at 11 o'Clock, by the Rev. John Duddell, Rector. The Parish contains between 3 and 4000 souls. St. Munchin's parish is in the gift of the Lord Bishop of Limerick.

*St. John's Church*.—supposed to have been erected early in the 15th Century, forms one side of St. John's Square; the length of the Church from east to west is 60 feet, and the breadth 63. In 1763, £500 was raised by contribution and sale of pews, by which the Church was enlarged and beautified; and during the life time of the excellent Vicar, the late Rev. John Fitzgibbon, an organ was put up and many other improvements made. Service on Sunday, at half past 11, and on Sunday evening at half-past 6 o'Clock. Several applications were made by the present worthy Vicar, the Rev. John Elmes, to the Church Commissioners, for a grant to light the Church, during the winter Sunday evenings, before an order could be obtained; during which period he delivered Lectures to the poor of the parish, in the Vestry room on Sunday



evenings. It is now however brilliantly lit with twenty Gas burners. The Parish contains over 12,000 souls, and is in the gift of the Earl of Limerick.

*St. George's Church.*—The service of this Church is still performed in the Primitive Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, Bedford-row; but the splendid new edifice at Pery square is progressing so rapidly, that we suppose it will be finished early the coming Spring. The hours at which divine service is performed at the temporary Chapel, is half-past 11 morning and a quarter past 7 on the evenings of Sunday. Chaplain, the Rev. Pryce Peacocke; The Ven. Archdeacon Maunsell, as Rector; and the Rev. Dawson Massy, as Curate of Saint Michael's Parish, generally officiate. The gift of this is also in the Pery family.

*Asylum Episcopal Chapel*, Upper Catherine-street, is a remarkably neat and spacious building, erected by voluntary contributions, collected chiefly through the exertions of the Ven. Edward Newenham Hoare. Its management is vested in Trustees and a Committee. Its support is derived mostly from pew-rent, weekly collections, &c. Service on Sundays at half-past eleven o'clock in the morning, and at seven in the evening. Chaplain, Rev. Edward N. Hoare; Assistant Chaplain, Rev. E. G. Carr. Trustees, Rev. E. G. Carr, Rev. Edward Herbert, Rev. Thomas Gibbins, and Ven. E. N. Hoare. Committee, Edward Bernard, R. G. Maunsell, F. Weldon Walshe, Richard Langford, John Perrott, and Arthur Sayers, Esqrs. This building originally had no galleries, but in order to accommodate the large congregations, subscriptions have been entered into for the erection of them.

*Primitive Wesleyan Methodist Chapel*, Bedford-row.—Service was first performed in this House on Sunday, the 23d December, 1821. It is a remarkably neat building in the Gothic style, with a carved stone front, handsome entrance, and elegant Iron Ballustrades. Preaching on Sundays, at eight o'clock in the morning, and at 6 in the evening. Preaching also on Monday and Thursday evenings, at 7 o'clock;—Prayer Meetings on the other week evenings (Saturday excepted) at 7 o'clock, and on the mornings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at half past 6 o'clock. Preacher, Mr. Robert Connolly.

*Wesley Chapel*, George's-street was erected in 1812, has a handsome hewn stone front, with a flight of steps and cast

*Iron Ballustrade.* Preaching on Sunday at seven o'clock in the morning, twelve at noon, and half-past six in the evening.—Preaching also on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at seven o'clock. Prayer Meetings on the other week evenings (Saturday excepted) at 7 o'clock, and on the mornings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at half-past six o'clock. Rev. Messrs. Howe and Williams, Ministers.

*Independent Chapel*, Bedford-row, Parish of St. Michael is a plain but commodious structure, Service on Sundays at seven o'clock in the morning, twelve at noon and seven in the evening, and on Monday and Thursday evenings, Rev. Dr. Townley, Minister,

*Presbyterian Meeting House*, Glentworth-street, Parish of St. Michael, Rev. Messrs. Pinkerton and M'Corkle, Ministers. Service on Sunday at twelve o'clock, noon, and three, evening.

*Friends' Meeting House*, Cecil-street, Parish of St. Michael. Worship on Sundays at ten and two o'clock, and on Thursdays at ten o'clock.

## ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPELS.

*Saint John's Chapel*—near John's-gate, erected in 1753, is built in the form of a Cross, and possesses a good painting of the Crucifixion by Mr. Colopy, a native of Limerick. This parish belongs to the Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, R. C. B. Rev. John Clarke, Chaplain, Rev. Messrs. O'Connor and Quin, Curates. Masses on Sundays, from seven to a quarter past twelve o'clock.

*Saint Michael's Chapel*, in Denmark-street, was opened on the 29th of September, 1781, it is a plain building. Parish Priest, Rev. P. Hogan. Masses every Sunday, from half-past seven to a quarter past twelve o'clock.

*St. Mary's Chapel* in St. Francis's Abbey, was finished in 1749, and has a fine painting of the Crucifixion, copied from the celebrated picture of Michael Angelo. Parish Priest, Very Rev. Charles Hanrahan, V. G. Rev. ———— Nolan, Rev. H. Fitzgibbon, and the Rev. John Nash, Curates.—Masses every Sunday from half-past seven to a quarter past twelve o'clock, and week days from a quarter past seven to nine.



*Saint Munchin's or Saint Lilia's*, Thomond-gate, is the oldest Chapel in the City, being built in the year 1744; Rev. Richard Walsh, P. P. Masses on Sundays, from half-past 8 to 12 o'Clock, and on week days at eight.

*Saint Patrick's Chapel*. Pennywell, was erected in 1750, chiefly at the private expence of Mr. Harold. Rev. Mr. Quaid, P. P. Rev. Mr. Murrane, Curate.

## FRIARIES.

*Agustinian Friary*, Georges'-street, formerly the Theatre, but purchased by the Rev. Mr. Cronin, in 1822, for £400, which with an outlay of about £600, rendered it a most beautiful Chapel. Rev. Robert Dore, Prior; Rev. James Dundon, and Rev. William Keating, Friars. Service on Sundays from seven until twelve o'clock. Week days from seven until nine.

*Dominican Chapel*, Glentworth-street, is a handsome building of hewn stone, in the Gothic style. It was erected in 1815. Rev. William M'Donnell, Provincial; Rev. Thomas M'Donnell, Prior; Rev. S. J. Harrigan, and Rev. L. D. Conway, Friars. Hours of service on Sundays, in Summer, from six in the morning to half-past one; and in Winter from seven to half-past one o'Clock.

*Franciscan Chapel*, situate in Henry-street, parish of St. Michael, Rev. Michael F. Malone, Superior—Rev. John Bergin, and Rev. Rodger Higgins, Friars. Service from seven in the morning to half-past twelve on Sundays, and from eight to nine on week days.

## PUBLIC CHARITIES.

### *Doctor Hall's Alms House,*

Was erected in Nicholas-street in 1761. It contains apartments for 13 men and 12 women, who by his will were each to receive £5 a year—two school-rooms and a salary of £2 per annum, to a Master and Mistress, for instructing 20 boys and 20 girls; the children of poor Protestant parents, who were afterwards to be apprenticed with a fee of Two guineas each. £10 a year for supplying the school with books and paper. £15 yearly to a Chaplain. £20 to the Steward, and £10 for the repairs of the Alms House. Dr. Hall also bequeathed £10 a year for the release of poor debtors from Prison, and £200 to be lent in small sums for three years to young men out of their apprenticeship, on giving sufficient security for the re-payment of the principal. The Lord Bishop and Dean of Limerick, with the Mayor, Recorder, and Sheriffs for the time being, were appointed Overseers to carry the design of this benevolent individual into effect. Under their good management the property has been rendered fully adequate to answer all the objects in the Doctor's will—and some years since, the annuities of the men and women were increased to £6, (£5 10s. 9d. present currency.) The entire building has lately undergone a thorough repair under the direction of James M'Mahon, Esq.

### *The Corporation Alms House*

Was erected soon after the siege of Limerick, on the ground where St. Nicholas's Church formerly stood, in Old Post-Office Lane. Twenty reduced widows have apartments in this house, with the use of a garden and 40s. a-year.

### *St. George's Widows Asylum,*

In Michael-street, was instituted by the Rev. William D. Hoare, and contains twelve Protestant widows, who receive £5 annually. Attached to it is a day school for 61 boys and 51 girls.

### *Mrs. Villars's Institution,*

Adjoining St. Munchin's Church-yard, Nicholas-street, is a very handsome building of hammered stone, beautifully and classically ornamented with gothic members. It comprises three sides of a square open to the west, and commands an ex-



cellent view of the river Shannon. The centre is ornamented with a clock and cupolo. It is intended as an asylum for Protestant or Presbyterian widows, who receive £24 a year each, besides three comfortable apartments. There are two school rooms attached for males and females, whose Teachers' salaries are also provided for by the will of Mrs. Villars. The building cost between three and four thousand pounds. Mrs. Villars was a native of Limerick, the only child of a gentleman named Scott, and maternally related to the Tuthill family,

### *Mrs. Craven's Charity.*

This lady, the widow of Alderman Craven, left a large house near West Watergate for the reception of twelve poor widows, to each of whom she also bequeathed 40s. annually. The building has long since been thrown down, but the Charity is well maintained, the widows receiving the bequest regularly at the office of Alderman Mahony, George's-street. Mrs. Craven also bequeathed the interest of £60—40s. of which are given on Christmas eve to confined debtors, and 40s. to the poor of the City parishes.

### *Mrs. Rose's Charity.*

The Widow of Geo. Rose, Esq. High Sheriff for this County in 1766, left £800 to the the Dean and Chapter of Limerick, that the interest might be equally divided every Christmas amongst 10 poor Widows, which is regularly paid by Archdeacon Maunsell.

### *St. John's Charity.*

The Church Wardens of St. John's Parish have £17 to distribute annually at discretion amongst the poor, the interest of various sums given at different periods by members of the Pery family.

### *St. John's Alms House.*

In old Francis-street, was opened through the exertions of late Rev. John Fitzgibbon, the lamented Vicar of St. John's Parish, for the reception of 12 poor widows, who receive a weekly stipend. It has no funds to support it but the Sunday collections in the church of that parish—The proceeds of public appeals and private subscriptions and donations.

### *City Dispensary.*

Originally in Bridge-street, but since the houses have been thrown down to open the entrance to the Cathedral, removed

to Rutland-street, has proved a great blessing to the poor of this City—Here professional advice is given and medicine dispensed gratis, compounded under the immediate inspection of Mr. Ryan, Apothecary to the Institution, to between 20 and 30,000 persons every year; we regret to hear a rumour of this useful Establishment being given up for want of Funds; we trust however, that the wealthy will come forward and out of their abundance contribute to support a charity which, annually relieves tens of thousands of our suffering fellow citizens, and in a great measure prevents disease from spreading amongst us.

### *Mendicity Association.*

Little can be said of this Society, as the charity is so badly supported that they cannot do much. The house stands between Henry-street and the Military Walk, and as far as the funds go, many of the poor receive daily food; the streets, notwithstanding, are infested with beggars, and many who are fed there during the day, take up the trade of begging on their return home each night, to the great annoyance of the shopkeepers. We trust, however, that a well regulated system of poor laws will be soon introduced into this country, which will relieve those who are really distressed and put an end to imposition.

### *Sick and Indigent Room-keepers' Society.*

Was instituted in 1826 under the patronage of the late Lord Bishop of Limerick. The subscription amounted to several hundred pounds, and his Lordship was a liberal annual contributor. We are sorry to observe that this Charity has been long on the decline, as the wants of many respectable room-keepers, who would sooner starve than beg, were relieved by it.

### *George Tierney, Esq.*

Vested £500 Irish in the hands of the Bishop and Dean of Limerick, that the interest might be divided annually, between four poor men and four poor women, at the choice of the Rev. George Roche, or his successor.



## CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

### *Barrington's Hospital.*

This Institution was founded and erected by Sir Joseph Barrington, Bart. and his sons, Mathew, Daniel, Croker, and Samuel Barrington, A. D. 1829, for the relief of the poor of their native City. It was opened for the reception of patients on the 5th of November, 1831, and it is the only general Hospital in this City. It is a fine cut stone building, situated on George's-quay, and presenting a very handsome front—at the top of which there is an illuminated Clock, the only one in the south of Ireland. The Barrington family having built the Hospital at an expence exceeding £4000, munificently handed it over, when finished, to their fellow Citizens, for the use of the distressed poor.

During the year ending the 31st of March, 1837, the following number of Medical and Surgical cases were treated in the Hospital, viz :—

Extern Patients have received advice, and numerous cases have been attended to during the past years, the number of which amounted to 23,350

In the year 1830, an act of Parliament was obtained for the management and direction of the Hospital—11th Geo. 4th cap. 72—by which all donors of a sum not less than Twenty guineas are constituted Governors for life; and every person who shall subscribe and pay any sum not less than Three guineas annually to be an annual Governor. Subscribers of Two guineas to have the power to recommend two patients, and Five guineas, five patients annully. The Hospital contains at present 35 beds; patients are only admitted on the ticket of a Governor, unless in cases of persons accidentally injured who are always immediately received. The day for the gen-

ral admission of patients is every Tuesday, at 12 o'Clock.—Patients' friends are allowed to visit them only on Mondays, except in cases where danger is apprehended. A Committee of Management is elected annully from among the Governors, on the second Monday in the month of January. The following Gentlemen are the present Committee :—

I. *Surgeons* Who give their services gratuitously for the benefit of the Institution, and attend daily from Ten to One o'Clock, to visit the Intern Patients, and give advice to Externs.—The latter are supplied with Medicine, gratis from the City of Limerick Dispensary, which, under the superintendence of its excellent Treasurer, affords extensive relief to the diseased poor.

Mr. Allen, *Resident Apothecary and Register.*—Mrs. Allen, *Matron.*

A wing has been lately erected, which is intended for a Lying-in Hospital, and will it is expected be open for the reception of patients, early in the present year. This addition to the original Building is solely at the private expence of the Barrington family.

Donations or Subscriptions, in support of the Institution, will be thankfully received and acknowledged by the Committee; by Sir JOSEPH BARRINGTON, Bart. Treasurer, and by Mr. ALLEN, at the Hospital.

N. B.—From the great expence of the article of Lint, and the amazing consumption of it in dressing, both Intern and Extern Patients, any quantity of clean old Linen will be considered of value and most thankfully received at the Hospital.



### *Mont de Piete or Charitable Pawn Office.*

This Establishment was erected under the immediate auspices of Matthew Barrington, Esq., and its construction formed on the model of the Mont de Piété of Paris.

Its object is in common with similar establishments of France, Italy, Germany and Holland, which have existed with undeviating prosperity for several hundred years—are to relieve the temporary wants of the Poor, by advancing money to them upon Pledges at a lower rate of interest than is charged by Pawbrokers: thus guarding them from greater exactions, and that the profits after paying the interest of the capital employed and the expenses of the establishment, shall be devoted to the use of the very class of persons from whom these profits are derived.

The immediate destination of the profits of the Limerick establishment is the maintainance and extension of the benefits of the Barrington Hospital and City of Limerick Infirmary.

The Mont de Piété commenced business on the 13th of March, 1837, under the direction of a Committee, consisting of

The Funds of the Establishment were raised by Debentures bearing interest at 6 per cent. per annum, and which is regularly paid twice in the year—on the 25th March and 29th September.

The actual results of the business since it commenced, comprising a period of only 7 months and a few days, have far surpassed the most sanguine expectations of its warmest friends—the Poor flock to it in thousands, in perfect confidence that they will receive a fair value for the articles they deposit, and that in the event of their deposits being sold, all surplus that may arise over and above the advance made to them, and the interest that may be due upon it, will be held at their disposal for two years from the date of the ticket, becoming at the end of that period, if unclaimed, the property of the Hospital.

Since the opening of the Establishment upwards of 63000 Pledges have been received, of which 45,000 have been already released. The sum of £11,750 has been lent and £6,500 received back by the release of property.

The Funds of the Establishment are daily encreasing, and little doubt now exists that in a very few years the Limerick Mont de Piété will support all the Charitable Institutions of the City. J. W. H. Haynes, Manager; Archibald Douglas, Inspector and Secretary.

### *House of Industry.*

Pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the Irish House of Commons in 1772, for establishing Poor Houses and Work Houses in every County, the Grand Juries of this County and City granted Presentments for £500, and the foundation of the house was laid on the 10th of March, 1774, by Joseph Johns, Esq. Mayor. Its situation is extremely wholesome, on the North Strand, on a plot of ground granted by Bishop Gore at a pepper-corn a-year for ever. It is a neat structure, forming a large square, built in courses, with a handsome front of cut stone. It has a garden and Infirmary in the rear of the building, with a number of cells for Lunatics; but since the erection of the Asylum on the Cork road, none are kept here but idiots and incurable lunatics. It is to be regretted that an institution of such importance as this has been made so small, for several years after its erection it had only to accommodate about 200 persons, but from the increase of the population, and proportionable increase of poverty, it has now daily within its walls upwards of 500 individuals, composed of the aged and infirm, beggars and strolling vagrants convicted of petty thefts, lunatics and idiots, widows and orphans, deserted children, &c. In consequence of the increase of its inmates, several additions were made to the building, which of necessity have encroached on and greatly contracted the yards. This inconvenience could not be avoided, as all the adjacent ground is in the possession of leasehold tenants. There are two schools attached to the Institution, male and female, conducted on the Lancasterian system and well attended. The expenses are met by Presentments on the County and City of Limerick, voluntary subscriptions and donations. Treasurer, Alderman Watson; Surgeon to the Institution, Richard Franklin, Esq.; Apo-



thecary, Mr. Wm. R. Monsell; House Steward, Mr. John Bassett; Keeper of Idiots, Mr. Simson.

### *St. John's Fever and Lock Hospital,*

Situate in John-street, has to boast of being the first Fever Hospital founded in the British empire. The design was originated by Lady Hartstonge, who in 1781 obtained the use of St. John's Barrack, and set up two or three beds in it. A subscription was immediately entered into for the purpose of extending this benevolent object, to which the Hartstonge and Pery family contributed £170, besides large yearly subscriptions. In the same year Sir Henry Hartstonge, M. P. for this County, obtained an Act of Parliament empowering the Government to grant to the Treasurer of this Hospital £100, and the City Grand Jury to present a similar sum at the ensuing Assizes. In 1787, the Governors resolved to take down the old building and erect one more suitable to the various objects of the Charity, which was happily accomplished. The benefits of this Institution are incalculable; it has been the means of checking the progress of contagion amidst a dense population, and rescuing tens of thousands from a premature grave.

We are happy to add, that Fever, though still prevalent, has been considerably on the decline since autumn, which seems attributable to the mild temperature of the season, as well as the abundant and wholesome supply of nutritious food.

### *The Lying-in Hospital,*

In Nelson-street, was opened for the reception of patients on the 1st of May, 1812. The late Miss White, a Roman Catholic lady, bequeathed £1000 in support of the funds, and Mrs. Banks, a Protestant lady, £1000.

#### *The District Lunatic Asylum, for the Counties of Limerick, Clare, Kerry, and City and Liberties of Limerick,*

Was erected on the Cork-road at an expense of £30,000. The centre forms an octagon, from which diverge four wings, containing 128 close cells for patients, and a similar number for convalescents. It is constructed of lime-stone, and extends 429 feet in front and 314 feet in depth. Extensive gardens are attached to the Establishment, and the interior arrangements are similar to the those of the Richmond Lunatic Asylum, Dublin. It was originally intended to accommodate 150 patients, but being found inadequate to the claims of so large and populous a district, it received an addition capable of containing 148 more. It is under the direction of a Board of Governors, who meet on the first Monday of every month, and oftener if necessary. The funds for its support are advanced in the first instance by Government, and repaid by Presentment on the several Counties of the Districts in proportion to the number of patients from each. No patient can be admitted without an affidavit of pauperism and a Medical Certificate of Insanity, which must be left at the Asylum for approval, previous to the Patient being sent. *Manager*, John Jackson, Esq. *Matron*, Mrs. Jackson, *Physician*, David O'Callaghan, Esq., M. D. *Apothecary*, R. Bocuhier, Esq. *Accountant*, Mr. M'Donnell.

### *City Limerick Infirmary.*

For the cure of diseases of the eye, for the investigation and cure of diseases of the chest, for attending the poor Lying-in Women at their own homes, and for visiting and attending the sick poor.

These valuable Medical Charities were established by Dr. Gore, in 1832, and have since been upheld by the contributions of benevolent individuals. Thousands of the poor, not only



of the city, but of the surrounding country, have experienced relief from them. One branch is at Thomondgate, for the convenience of the poor of that neighbourhood and the North Liberties, another has been opened within the last year in Cecil-street, at the instance of town subscribers, for the advantage of the poor of the city and the south Liberties; and so zealously determined is Dr. Gore, to uphold the utility of these institutions, that he visits the poor in every direction when recommended by subscribers, in and about the city and its suburbs. A most interesting case occurred this year in the person of a woman whose husband was in the employment of A. J. Watson, Esq. Castle Connell, who, being blind of both eyes for a long time, was restored to the blessings of sight after the operation for Cataract performed by Dr. Gore; many of the subscribers saw this woman after the operation. There are now no medical charities in Limerick from which the poor are attended at their own homes, but these, and the public are deeply indebted to Dr. Gore for his untiring exertions.

The Institutions in Cecil-street are open daily at 10 and 4 o'clock, and at Thomond-gate at 12 o'clock on Mondays.

Wednesdays, and Fridays, They highly deserve public support.

#### *Magdalen Asylum.*

This valuable institution is situated in a remarkably healthy and retired situation, in upper Clare street. In this establishment, the child of sorrow—the dupe of Man's perfidy—the wanderer, wearied of daily tracking the highway of sin, finds a safe and sanctified retreat, and it is to be regretted, that an institution which tends to the retrieving from the paths of misery, numbers of our fellow mortals, should from the majority of the inhabitants of Limerick, meet with such trifling support. Its Funds are derived from Public Subscription, Charity Sermons, the Interest of £1000 left by the late Miss White, and by washing. *Physician, W. J. Geary, M. D.*

#### *The County Hospital.*

This excellent Institution had its origin in the benevolent exertions of the late Surgeon Vandeleur, who in the year 1759 took four small houses in the Little Island, which he threw into one, for the reception of poor persons who were sick and maimed. Four beds were put up with the product of a sermon, a play, and some small subscriptions, but from the number of applicants for relief, it was found that this asylum was too limited. In 1765, the late Viscount Pery granted a piece of ground in St. Francis's Abbey, at a pepper-corn a-year, on which was erected a more suitable building, which was styled the County Hospital, and capable of containing 40 beds. Under the excellent management of the Governors and Governesses this establishment flourished for nearly half a century, dispensing relief to thousands of the children of disease, which they could not obtain at home.—It was however deemed necessary to erect an edifice on an improved plan and more agreeable situation, and the site where the present building stands, on the Cork road, was selected as one best suited for the purpose. It was opened for the reception of patients in 1811; the lower floor contains a hall, board-room, surgery, kitchen, and various other apartments, and on the two upper floors are ten wards for male, and six for female patients. It exhibits a front of one hundred and fourteen feet in length and forty-one in height.—The total expense of the building exceeded seven thousand pounds. This Institution is supported by presentment and private subscriptions. Patients are admitted only by Sub-



scriber's tickets, except in cases of accident, when they are admissible without a ticket at all hours. The following is a return of patients admitted from 1st April, 1837, up to the 1st October, 1837 :

*Limerick Cow-Pock Institution*, Established 1830, for the gratuitous Vaccination of the children of the poor.—Vaccinated, 872. Packages of Lymph distributed, 475. *Medical Director*, William J. Geary, Esq. 52, George's-street. Attendance daily at 9 o'Clock, A. M.

### FREE SCHOOLS.

In addition to the schools attached to some of the charitable Institutions already mentioned, are *The Blue School*, the es-

tablishment of which originated in 1717, by a bequest of the Rev. John Moore, of £17 per year, to which 4 year afterwards the Corporation voted £20 per annum. In 1724, Mrs. Craven conveyed houses producing a profit rent of £40 per year, to the Bishop, Dean, Mayor, Recorder, and their successors, for the use of this school.—In 1748 it was suffered to go to decay, but in 1772 it was revived by the exertions of Bishop Gore, and the Hon. Dean Crosbie—since then it has undergone many changes; and it is a cause of regret that exertions are not made to place it on that footing its utility deserves. The School-room is commodious and airy, and the greatest attention is paid to the boys by the school-master, Mr. John Smith,

### *Parochial Shool of St. John's Parish.*

The Earl of Limerick has granted a plot of ground in this Parish, for the purpose of erecting a School-house, for the education of the numerous protestants, and other poor of this parish, on sound Scriptural principles; and a considerable sum has been already raised by voluntary contributions for that purpose. The School-house is in progress, and is calculated to accommodate 200 children, there will be two School-rooms, one for males and the other for females, besides apartments for master and mistress. This desirable object is being brought about by the exertions of the present Vicar, The Rev. John Elmes.

### *Hibernian School,*

In James's-street, near Pery-square, is maintained by a grant from the Hibernian Society, subscriptions and donations. Here between 50 and 100 boys attend daily, who receive a gratuitous education, comprising a course of English and Science. In the lower part of the building is a female school, where a similar number of children are daily instructed—convenient to this department is an Infant school, at which are upwards of 40 children. There is also another Infant school in St. John's-square, at which a number of children attend, supported by the Powerscourt family.

### *New School House*

In Henry-street, erecting under the superintendence of the Rev. John Duddell, in accordance with the desire of the late Mrs. H. Villars, who munificently left a large sum of money for the purpose, will, when finished, accommodate about 30



Orphans, who are to be educated, lodged and clothed. In addition to which a number of day scholars will be received. It will have apartments for a master and mistress, to whom a suitable salary will be given.

### *Christian Schools, Sexton-st. and Clare-street.*

Established in June, 1816, for the education of poor boys, and conducted by religious brothers of the Institute of the Christian Schools.—The community consist of Six Brothers, the present Superior of the House is Mr. E. A. Dumphy. In these Schools upwards of 800 poor boys receive gratuitously, the benefits of a well-ordered system of moral, religious, and literay education; the system adopted is based upon the Lancasterian. Many of the children are clothed, others apprenticed to trades, and a considerable number when duly qualified are provided with situations in respectable shops and public offices. The moral and religious instructions of the children is scrupulously attended to by the Religious Brothers, who endeavour, by a timely antidote, to preserve the children from falling victims to the contagion of vice and bad example. Although the moral and religious instruction of children is the primary object of the institution, yet they are taught such branches of science as are necessary to qualify them for the various trades and occupations in which they may be engaged in after life. The Schools are supported by voluntary contributions, and the produce of an annual charity sermon: Donations and Subscription thankfully received by the Rev. Dr. Ryan, by the Catholic Clergy of the city, or by the Religious Brothers at their residence, Sexton-street. Children of all religious denominations admissible to those schools and no interference with their religious principles.

*The Nunnery School*—In Barrack-street, educates upwards of 400 females of the Roman Catholic Persuasion—they are well instructed in reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, and Needle Work.

*Sunday Schools* are now established in nearly every part of Limerick, viz:—At the Primitive Wesleyan Methodist House, being the first in Limerick; at Wesley Chapel; St. Munchin's and St. John's Churches; at Rev. Dr. Townly's; at Hibernian School; at St. John's Square; and at North Prior's Land, in the North Liberties. Adjoining the latter school, is the Residence of the REV. WILLIAM LEWIS, Killeely Glebe; the view

from this place is particularly admired, commanding an extensive prospect of the River Shannon, and the County Tipperary, and County Clare Mountains. It is but justice to the present incumbent, to say that the House which was nearly a Ruin when he was appointed, is now in as good order as any Glebe House in Ireland, he has besides, at his own expence, in addition to the old foot-way leading from Thomondgate, recently opened a handsome carriage entrance from the Killeely Road.

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## CIVIC EDIFICES.

*The Exchange*, in Mary-street, was originally built in 1673, by Alderman Yorke, at a cost of £400; but having suffered considerable injury during the seige, it was rebuilt in 1702 at the expense of the Corporation during the Mayoralty of Alderman Davis, and again remodified in 1778 during the Mayoralty of Alderman T. Smyth. This last alteration was deemed necessary as it projected into the street, but the Dean and Chapter having bestowed a small part of the church-yard, to remove that inconvenience it underwent the final alteration at a cost of £1500. The Council Chamber is a spacious room, being 40 feet long, 30 feet wide, and 15 feet high. It was enlivened on the evening of the 4th October last by a splendid Fancy Ball given by our late excellent Chief Magistrate, John Vereker, Esq. the proceeds of which went to purchase fuel for the poor. We confess our inadequacy to speak in proper terms of the great exertions made by this gentleman during his Mayoralty to ameliorate the condition of a large portion of our population. It is not within the province of a periodical of this description to comment on the private or public character of any individual, but when we recollect that from the period of Mr. Vereker's having received the rod to the time of his resignation of it to his present successor, his career has been marked by successive acts of benevolence, we cannot withhold our meed of praise, feeble though it be.

The present Civic Officers are Edmund Morony, Esq., Mayor, Richard Franklin and Henry Vereker, Esqrs., Sheriffs, Carew Smyth, Esq., Recorder, Edward Parker, Esq., Town Clerk, Clerk of the Crown and Clerk of the Peace, Mr. Edward Costelloe, Deputy Clerk of the Peace.

*City Court House*.—This building, which was erected in



the years 1733-4 during the Mayoralty of Robert Hallam, Esq., cost the city £700, £200 of which was bestowed by the Corporation. It is situated in Bridge-street, measures 64 feet by 34, but the erection of a new Court-house on another site is now spoken of.

*The City Gaol*, on Merchant's-quay, was erected on the site of the old Deanery house and garden, and was finished towards the close of the last century; annexed to it was the County Jail, but since the erection of the new County Jail on the Cork road, that portion occupied by the County prisoners was added to the City Jail. It is now a spacious building, and as great a degree of cleanliness & order preserved there thro' the vigilance of its officers as in any prison in Ireland. Alderman Gibson, Local Inspector, John Moore, Esq., Governor, Mr. John Worrall, Deputy Governor, Rev. Henry Gubbins, Protestant Chaplain, Rev. Charles Hanrahan, Roman Catholic Chaplain.

*County Court House*, convenient to the City Jail on Merchant's-quay, was finished in 1810, at an expense of about £12,000, levied off the County. It contains a lofty hall, separate Courts for transacting civil and criminal business, convenient jury rooms and offices for clerks of Crown and Peace. Malachi Fallon, Esq., Assistant-Barrister, S. E. S. Rice, Mount-Trenchard, High Sheriff, William Smith, Esq., Lower Mallow-street, Sub-Sheriff, Daniel Barrington, Esq., Barrington-street, Clerk of the Crown, James Barry, Esq., Shannon-street, Deputy ditto, Wyndham Magrath Fitzgerald Esq., George-street, Clerk of the Peace, Mr. Mathew H. De Courcy, Upper William-street, Deputy ditto.

*County Jail*, Cork road, was commenced in 1817, and completed in 1821, at an expense of £23,000. £2,000 were expended for the erection of a tread mill, kitchen laundry &c. It is a spacious building and presents quite a castellated appearance. In it are 22 apartments for debtors and 103 cells for criminals and convicts. There are also five solitary cells for prisoners ordered for execution, which are also occasionally used to punish insubordination in any of the prisoners before or after trial.

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## BRIDGES.

*Thomond Bridge*—Several pieces of this new structure, are

now visible above the water, and it is hoped very considerable progress will be made before the end of next summer.

*The New Bridge*—Forming the direct communication between the New and Old Town, was finished in 1762. It is composed of three arches, the central of which is 41 feet wide.—Built under the superintendence of Mr. Ugald.

*Baul's Bridge*—Connecting the English and Irish Town, was built by the New Inland Navigation Company, who commenced taking down the old bridge, in November, 1831.—Architects, Messrs. G. and R. Pain.. The old structure on which the present neat bridge is built, consisted of six small arches, and had houses built on it from one extremity to the other. The period of its erection is not known, though taken notice of in the map drawn in the reign of Queen ELIZABETH, by the name of the "Tide Bridge."

*Park Bridge*—Crossing the Abbey River. is an old, mean and dangerous structure; it is in contemplation to build a new bridge adjacent to it, when the old one will come down.

*Athlunkard Bridge*—A very neat construction, was built in the year 1830, by the Commissioners under the Act 4, Geo. IV. and reflect much credit on the Messrs. Pain.

*Wellesley Bridge*—was erected in the year 1831, by Commissioners under Act 4, Geo. IV., consists of five arches, and has a swivel arch at the extremity leading to Brunswick-street. Towards the building of this bridge, Government advanced a Loan of £60,000, to be repaid by tolls collected on the bridge and from the shipping arriving at the port of Limerick. The Docks intended to be connected with this bridge, are now in progress under the superintendence of Sir Thos Deane & Co.

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## BARRACKS.

*The Castle Barrack* was erected in the year 1751, partly on the ruins of King John's Castle, and is capable of containing 500 men. The battlements of the Castle were not demolished till the close of the last century. The first regular building of this nature, was erected in the reign of King Charles 2d. on the site of Dominican Friary, in old Barrack-street, where two Regiments were constantly stationed for a century and a-half. Previous to this period, regular soldiers were quar-



tered in the Castle, and also in the Citadel, near John's-gate; the latter place was made use of for that purpose till the year 1752.

*The New Barracks* finished in 1793, occupies a healthy situation, and possesses accommodation for a Regiment of infantry and a squadron of Horse.

*The Artillery Barrack*, on the Cork road, was completed in 1807, and is a very neat structure possessing a good range of stabling. A brigade of Artillery is quartered here, and the armoury contains over 5000 stand of arms, &c.

*The Police Barrack* is situated in a very central situation, (as regards the New Town) in Henry-street. The police force was formed in Limerick in 1821; the members of the City Police are an orderly, active, and respectable set of men, and the establishment is altogether one of considerable utility.—The Commissioners of St. Michael's Parish have a day patrol, with instructions similar to those of the London Police. This establishment reflects considerable credit on the Commissioners, whose exertions for the improvement of St. Michael's Parish are duly acknowledged by the public.

## MANUFACTORIES.

Since the introduction of Machinery into England, Limerick as a manufacturing City no longer exists. There are, however, a few who still keep the trade going on here, amongst whom we may notice Mr. F. Mahony, of St. John's-square, in the woollen and stuff, and Mr. J. Unthank, of Mungret-street, in the linen and stuff trade.

*The Embroidery and Lace Factories* at Mount-Kenneth and Carr's garden, Charles Walker, Esq., proprietor. This excellent establishment, the first of the kind introduced into Limerick, gives employment to a great number of young girls, who would otherwise be left exposed to all the evils of which idleness is the fruitful parent. Too much merit cannot be given to Mr. Walker for the judicious manner in which the discipline of those establishments is carried on.

*The Weaving Factory*, in St. Francis' Abbey, belonging to Buchanan, Allan & Co., is the only one of the kind in Ireland. It affords employment to nearly 200 boys as apprentices under the age of 15 years, who have been taught to weave

silk and cotton shawls, equal to any of the same class made in Scotland. Some idea may be formed of the exertions required to bring this establishment to its present perfection, when it is known that 14 different branches of trade are carried on under the same roof, some of them the most intricate and extraordinary that can be imagined. The Embroidery Factory in Clare-street, belonging to same gentlemen, employs nearly 800 females, residing in Limerick, besides a great many in the surrounding towns and villages.

*The Lace Factory*, in Clare-street, William Lloyd, Esq., proprietor, is conducted on the same principle as those at Mount-Kenneth and Carr's Garden.

## MARKETS.

In addition to those already alluded to for the sale of Butter, Corn, &c. there are two excellent Meat Markets in this city, one, (the Newtown,) in Deemark-street, extending to Ellen-street, having 40 stalls—the other in Lower Cecil-street and Henry-street, (the Northumberland,) containing 20 stalls—each is attached a Fish, Fowl and Vegetable Market. Besides these, there are several other minor Meat Markets, one in Mungret-street, one in West-Water-Gate, one in the English-town, and one in John-street.

*The Potato Markets* are held on George's-quay and John's-gate, near the Fever Hospital. The Fruit Market is held near Baal's-Bridge, and extends from part of George's-quay to Sir Harry's Mall. The Hay Market is held in a large yard enclosed for the purpose, off Ellen-street; it is also used for a Cattle Market. The Pig Markets are held at St. Francis' Abbey, and Newtown-mahon.

*The Wheat Market*, between Mungret-street, Carr-street and Corn-Market-Row, has undergone considerable improvement during the past year. One of the gates in Carr-street has been greatly enlarged, in order that loads of hay, straw, &c. coming to the machine to be weighed may enter one and pass out the other gate without the inconvenience of turning round. The large house built in the centre of the Mungret-street side has been handsomely fitted up for the accommodation of merchants. These improvements were made at the private expense of Alderman Vereker (the Weighmaster), our late respected Mayor.



*Hide and Skin Crane*, in West Watergate, has been established for the weight and sale of green hides, a large quantity of which is disposed of in this market, both for this City and Cork. E. Morony, Esq., Crane Master.

*Butter Weigh-House*, adjoining the Linen Hall, was built in 1824, and is peculiarly adapted for the sale and inspection of Butter coming to the Limerick market. John Vereker, Esq., Weighmaster, Mr. J. Lane, Deputy, William Wheeler and Richard Barry, Esqrs., Inspectors.

*Linen Hall*—Owing to exertions of the Chamber of Commerce, who expended £100 out of its own funds, together with a grant of £300 by the County Grand Jury, this neat and commodious edifice was erected out of a fund allocated by a board of Directors in London.



### LOANS.

*Linen Hall Loan*.—The Committee of this Institution affords loans not exceeding £10 each to operatives, payable at a given time with interest.

*Pery Loan* was formed in 1770 by voluntary contributions amounting to £636 14s. 6d, of which sum over £500 was subscribed by members of the Pery family. The individuals accommodated with this loan, not exceeding £3 to each person, repay it by instalments of 2s. 7d. each fortnight.

*Jubilee Loan* was established in 1810, in commemoration of the 50th year of the reign of his Majesty, George III—£1200 were contributed on the occasion, and continues to be lent to individuals possessing proper security, in sums from £1 to £5—repaid in weekly instalments of 1s. to the pound.



### *Munster General Annuity Endowment Society,*

Office, 9, William-street, had its origin in Limerick, and was instituted January, 1836, in conformity with the Acts 10 Geo. IV., c. 56, and 4 and 5, William IV. c. 40, passed for the Protection and Regulation of such Societies.

Its object is simply to give those persons who are unable to effect insurances, a means of securing a competence, by Annuity for their widows, children, relatives, &c. at their decease; and also to reduce the Premiums, payable for such Annuities, to the lowest possible rate for the public generally, so that any person who prefers securing a yearly interest to a

sum of money for his family at his death, may have an opportunity of doing so, on the principle of mutual assurance, by which it is calculated that one-fourth of the premium in the ordinary mode will secure a larger life income.

The Premiums vary from 30s. per annum, at 25, to £5, at 60 years of age, and the annuity secured from £25 to £50 per annum, which last sum it can never exceed.—See *Adv.*

The Society hold their exhibitions in the Spring, Summer and Autumn of every year, and have much improved the Science of Horticulture. The Society has progressed considerably, and have received great eclat for the splendour of their exhibitions.



*Farming Society*, for the County and City of Limerick, counties of Tipperary and Clare, was instituted September, 1834, for the improvement of stock, farming implements, ploughing matches, green crops, draining and lining of land, &c. Annual subscriptions of 10l. and upwards constitute members of this Society. There are two meetings held in the year, one in March and the other in October, at the Linen Hall yard, Carr-street. After the exhibition the Members dine together. An annual committee is elected: the High Sheriff, for time being, is the President. The formation of this Society has been of incalculable value to the Agricultural interests of the surrounding counties. The Committee meet at the Linen Hall. James Bodkin, Esq. Sec. & Treasurer.



*St. Patrick's Orphan Society.*—Founded in 1832, in Clare-street. This Society has increased from its original number of 23 members to over 200, which are elected by ballot, one black bean in five to exclude. The annual subscription from each member is one guinea. There are at present 30 orphans fed, clothed, lodged, and educated. No orphans are admissible but the children of natives of the City and County of Limerick, who are not under the age of 8 nor over 12 years. Donors of three guineas are governors for five years; five guineas for eight years, or ten guineas for life.

*Protestant Orphan Society.*—The Committee of this Institution meet on first Wednesday of each month at the Diocesan Depository, Rutland-street, for transacting business. A large number of orphans are now on the establishment, who are located in different Protestant families of good character.—The funds are derived from subscriptions, donations, and annual charity sermons. Rev. Godfrey Massy, Treasurer.

*Limerick Temperance Society.*—Holds its meetings at Dr. Townley's Chapel, Bedford-Row, the use of which has been gratuitously given by the Rev. Gentleman. This Society has now been working for some years, and (considering the opposition it has met) with great success.—Their Festivals have been attended by many families of the first distinction in this City.—Their members amount to upwards of 300. Mr. J. H. Boyd, Secretary.

*Gas Company Works* are situated at Mount-Kenneth.—Limerick was first lit with Gas in 1825, and the Company now derive a very considerable income from the speculation, as nearly every house in the Newtown has got in the gas, and all the public streets are lit with it. *Limerick Water Works Company.*—Have their engine house near Plassy, and the Tanks for the reception of the water which supplies the City, convenient to the Black-boy turnpike. Office, Bedford-row—Richard Kane, Esq. Agent.

## PLACES OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE AMUSEMENT.

*Royal Western Yacht Club.*—Amongst the Public Amusements the Citizens of Limerick enjoy, the SHANNON REGATTA is not the least worthy of notice. It takes place generally in August, and is hailed with feelings of intense interest. Places of Rendezvous are Kilrush, Tarbert, and Limerick; at the two former Yachts Boats and Canoes run, at the last, boats only. Each place is enlivened with a ball previous to the departure of the fleet.

*Theatre.*—Once in the possession of two Theatres—no buildings of this description at present exist in Limerick. A portion of the Assembly House, Charlotte's-quay, has been converted into a Theatre, and notwithstanding many disadvantages over which the projectors could have no control, has given general satisfaction. Through the exertions of Mr. Seymour, the lessee, the most celebrated performers on the British boards have been brought here to perform, and we are informed that before another winter a splendid new Theatre will be erected in the most central part of the New Town.

*Public Promenades.*—It is a cause of very great regret that Limerick should be so destitute of public walks. The Wellesley Bridge is generally crowded when the weather is fine, and George-street in the evenings. New (Pery) Square is tastefully laid out, but this walk is denied to the Citizens, except such as are willing to pay a yearly rent for the privilege of having a key. When the improvements at the north side of the City are completed, the citizens will have a splendid walk, commanding a view of the Shannon. The Canal Company might make a very desirable promenade if the Canal Bank were planted at both sides, and a good foot path made.



*Roche's Garden, Henry-street*—The Hanging Gardens of Limerick bear testimony of the taste of their projector and proprietor, William Roche, Esq., M.P., one of the City Representatives. Those gardens extending from the rear of Mr. Roche's house in George's-street, to Henry-street, occupying about an acre of ground; they are formed on arches varying in height from 25 to 40 feet. Flights of steps lead from one elevation to another—the side terraces are 150 feet long by 30 wide—the central one 180 feet long, by 40 wide, and the lower 200 feet long, and 100 feet wide, exclusive of the melon and cucumber ground, which is 80 feet square. The top of the highest terrace wall is 70 feet above the street, and commands an extensive view of the Shannon and surrounding country. The redundant moisture is conveyed away through tubes concealed in the buttments of the arches to the main sewer, which in summer are stopped and thereby the moisture retained.—The damp is prevented from penetrating to the stores under the gardens by flags cemented together. In a word the visitor is presented with a "*rus in urbe*,"—or rather a resemblance to some of those fairy enchantments read of in Eastern lore, where the busy hum of men is instantaneously exchanged, for some of the perfumed bowers of Arabia.

*Royal Gymnasium* in Catherine-place, Mons. Huiguinen, proprietor. Open every day.

*Swinburn's Ball Room* in Brunswick-street, Mr. James Swinburn, proprietor, is well adapted for exhibitions and public meetings.

*Northumberland Buildings* in Lower Cecil-street, Mr. T. Mark, proprietor, is similarly adapted.

*Racing Grounds* at Newcastle, about 2 miles from this city, on the Dublin road; and at Loughmore, about 3 miles on the Kerry road.

### READING ROOMS.

*The Club House* is a very ornamental building, in George-street; it reckons among its members, almost all that is respectable and wealthy, we may say in the province, beside members from all parts of the Empire. Its members, are as usual in such establishments, chosen by ballot.

*The Limerick Institution*, George's-street, is conducted with regularity and taste; the Reading and News Rooms are well

adapted for their several purposes; the Library contains a large and highly valuable selection of Books, and the arrangements such as give general satisfaction. Persons intending to be subscribers, must be proposed a certain time before the ballot for admission.

*The Chamber of Commerce Reading Room* is attached to the Commercial Buildings and is solely for the use of the members of the Chamber. It consists of a splendid library, and receives in almost all the newspapers of the United Kingdom as well as some American, French and Australasian, with Magazines and other periodicals.

*Commercial Buildings Coffee and Reading Room*, is on the ground floor of the establishment, which is very large and elegantly fitted up. It is nearly as well supplied with newspapers and periodicals as the upper room. The members must be admitted by ballot only.

*Mechanics' Institute*, on Arthur's-quay, has a very select library, and takes in some choice newspapers.

Stamped Newspapers sent within one week after publication, without covers, or in covers open at the sides, are forwarded by the Packets free of charge to the British Colonies, France, Spain, (*via* Cadiz,) Hamburgh, Bremen, Denmark, Greece, the Ionian Isles, Buenos Ayres, Columbia, Caraccas, Carthagena, Bogota and Hayti, by private ships at one penny each. To all other foreign places, the charge will be two pence each. Any Newspaper containing an enclosure, or with any mark, writing or information on it, except the address, is chargeable with the postage of a triple letter.

All double, triple, and other letters and packets whatever, pay in proportion to the respective rates of single letters; packets chargeable by weight pay after the rate of four single letters, for every oz. weight, and so on in proportion for any greater weight, reckoning every quarter of an ounce equal to a single letter.

Members of Parliament possess the privilege of franking ten, and receiving fifteen letters daily: they are chargeable however, if above an ounce weight.

A penalty of £10 is enacted for sending any letter or letters, or any collection of letters, by any other conveyance than through the Post Office, excepting such letters as shall respectively concern goods sent by common known carriers of goods, carts, cars, waggons, or pack horses, which shall be respectively delivered with the goods such letters may contain, without hire or reward, or other profit or advantage for receiving or delivering such letters.

# SOLUTIONS TO LAST YEAR'S QUESTIONS.

(For Figures see Plate.)

*Question 1, by Mr. Matthew Collins, Limerick.*

To draw a straight line from a point in the diameter produced of a semicircle, cutting the circle, so that the intercept within the circle may be to the chord connecting the points of section on the convex circumference in a given ratio.

*Solution, by Mr. Matthew John Collins, Public and Private Teacher of Mathematics, Limerick.*

A (Fig. 1) is the given point in the diameter, BD produced to draw the secant AFG, so that BF:FG may be given—draw the tangent AC and demit CE perpendicular on BD, then by theor. 50 at the end of Luby's Euclid. BG and FD intersect on CE as at O now angles BGD and OED are right  $\therefore$  21 & 22 /3 angle OGE=angle ODE  $\therefore$  =angle FGB and angle BFG=angle EOG since BDG is their common supplement; thus triangles BFG, EOG are equiangular  $\therefore$  OG:OE::FG:FB and is  $\therefore$  given, but as triangles BEO, GHO are similar  $\therefore$  BE:GH::OE:OG  $\therefore$  as BF:FG and BE being given  $\therefore$  GH is had by 12 /6, and DH  $\times$  DG=DB  $\times$  DE which is given, so it is only to cut a given line HG externally, so that the rectangle of its segments may be given and is done in (298) Lardner's Enclid.

*Question 2, by Mr. Matthew Collins, Limerick.*

Given the hypotenuse of a right-angled triangle, to construct it so that the rectangle under the bisector of one of the acute angles, and the segment of the opposite side intercepted between it and the hypotenuse may be a maximum.

*Solution, by Mr. Matthew John Collins, Limerick.*

Let AEB (Fig. 2) be the required right-angled triangle on the given hypotenuse AB, AO the bisector of the angle A,

demit OC perpendicular on AB and bisect the angle BOC by OD and as the supplemental angle COE is plainly bisected by OA  $\therefore$  3 and 4/6 AB, AD, AC are in harmonic progression, & similar triangles AOB, BOD we have  $AB \times OD = AO \times OB$  which latter will  $\therefore$  be a maximum when OD is so since AB is constant, but 47/1  $AD \times DC = OD^2$  since angle AOD is right, and thus AB the first of 3 lines in harmonic progression is given to find the other two AD, AC so that the rectangle under the 2nd and its excess above the 3d may be a maximum put  $AB=a$ ,  $AD=x$ ,  $AC=y$ , then  $\frac{1}{a}$ ,  $\frac{1}{x}$ ,  $\frac{1}{y}$  are in arithmetical progression since they are the reciprocals of quantities in harmonic progression, therefore  $\frac{1}{a} + \frac{1}{y} = \frac{2}{x} \therefore$   $\frac{1}{y} = \frac{2a-x}{ax} \therefore x(x-y) = x^2 \times \frac{a-x}{2a-x}$  which will be a maximum when its 1st derivative relative to  $x$  is = zero i. e. when  $2x^2 - 7ax + 4a^2 = 0$  from which quadratic  $x$  is given  $\therefore$  &c.—If it

were required to have  $AO \times OB$  a maximum its square ( $AO^2$ )  $\times (OB^2)$  should also be a maximum, but  $AO^2 = AD \times AC$  and  $OB^2 = AB \times BD$  substituting these and rejecting the constant power of the given line AB we have  $AD \times AC \times BD^m$  i. e.  $x \times \left(\frac{ax}{2a-x}\right)^m \times (a-x)^n = \text{maximum}$  the derivative of the naperian log being equated to zero gives  $\frac{2m}{x} - \frac{n}{a-x} + \frac{m}{2a-x} = 0$ , a quadratic whence  $x$  is given.

*Question 3, by Mr. Matthew Collins, Limerick.*

Required the equation of the curve formed by a meridian in the globular projection.

*Solution by Mr. Matthew John Collins, Public and Private Teacher of Astronomy, Limerick*

A meridian (Fig. 3) in the globular projection of the sphere being represented by a circle, its equation in its most general form is  $\therefore Ay^2 + Bxy + Ax^2 + Dy + Ex + F = 0$ , where the axes of co-ordinates make an angle whose cosine =  $\frac{B}{2A}$  see art. 130, Lardner's Algebraic Geometry.



Question 4, by Mr. Matthew John Collins, Limerick.

From a given point without a given circle draw any pair of secants cutting the convex circumference in  $A B$  and the concave in  $C D$ . Let  $A D$  and  $B C$  intersect in  $O$ , and  $A B$  and  $C D$  in  $P$ ; required the locus of the points  $O, P$  by a method far more concise than that commonly given for finding the locus of  $O$ . Hence prove the following theorem: The right line joining the centre of a circle to the intersection of the diagonals of any inscribed quadrilateral, is perpendicular to the line adjoining the intersections of its opposite sides.

*Solution by the Proposer.*

$EAC$  (Fig. 4) and  $EBD$  are a pair of secants, &c. let  $PO$  cut  $EC$ ,  $ED$  at  $GH$  when  $O$  is a point within triangle  $BDP$   $\therefore$  by 58 of Luby's theorems  $ED$ ,  $EC$  are cut harmonically at  $B$ ,  $H$  and  $A$ ,  $G$  (as I shall shew, when done with this, for the sake of inexperienced readers,) but they would be also cut harmonically by the line joining the points of contact of 2 tangents from  $E$  by 62 of Luby (which I'll prove also for the same reason) thus the line joining the points of contact of 2 tangents from  $E$  must pass through  $G$ ,  $H$  and  $\therefore$  thro  $P$  and  $O$  and is  $\therefore$  the locus of these points, QED. The foregoing demonstration holds good for every conic section *mutatis mutandis*. To prove the annexed theorem,  $ABCD$  being the inscribed quadrilateral  $O$  the intersection of its diagonals  $E$ ,  $P$  the intersections of the opposite sides and  $N$  the centre, and since the line joining the intersection of two tangents to the centre is always perpendicular to that joining the points of contact  $\therefore$  by the foregoing theorem  $POK$  is perpendicular to  $EN$ , and for the like reason  $EOL$  is perpendicular to  $NP$ , and since the perpendiculars demitted from the angles of any triangle on the opposite sides meet on one point  $\therefore NO$  produced must be perpendicular to  $PE$ . QED.

Note on compound ratio.—If  $A$  be  $\frac{2}{3}$  of  $B$ ,  $B$   $\frac{4}{7}$  of  $C$ ,  $C$   $\frac{5}{8}$  of  $D$ , it is clear that  $A$  is  $\frac{2}{3}$  of  $\frac{4}{7}$  of  $\frac{5}{8}$  of  $D$ , that is if the ratio of  $A$  to  $B$  be  $\frac{2}{3}$ , the ratio of  $B$  to  $C$   $\frac{4}{7}$ , the ratio of  $C$  to  $D$   $\frac{5}{8}$ , then the ratio of  $A$  to  $D$  will be  $\frac{2}{3}$  of  $\frac{4}{7}$  of  $\frac{5}{8}$ ; this is what is meant when we say the ratio of the 1st magnitude to the last is compounded of the ratios of the 1st to the 2nd, the 2nd to the 3rd, the 3rd to the 4th, and so on to the last.

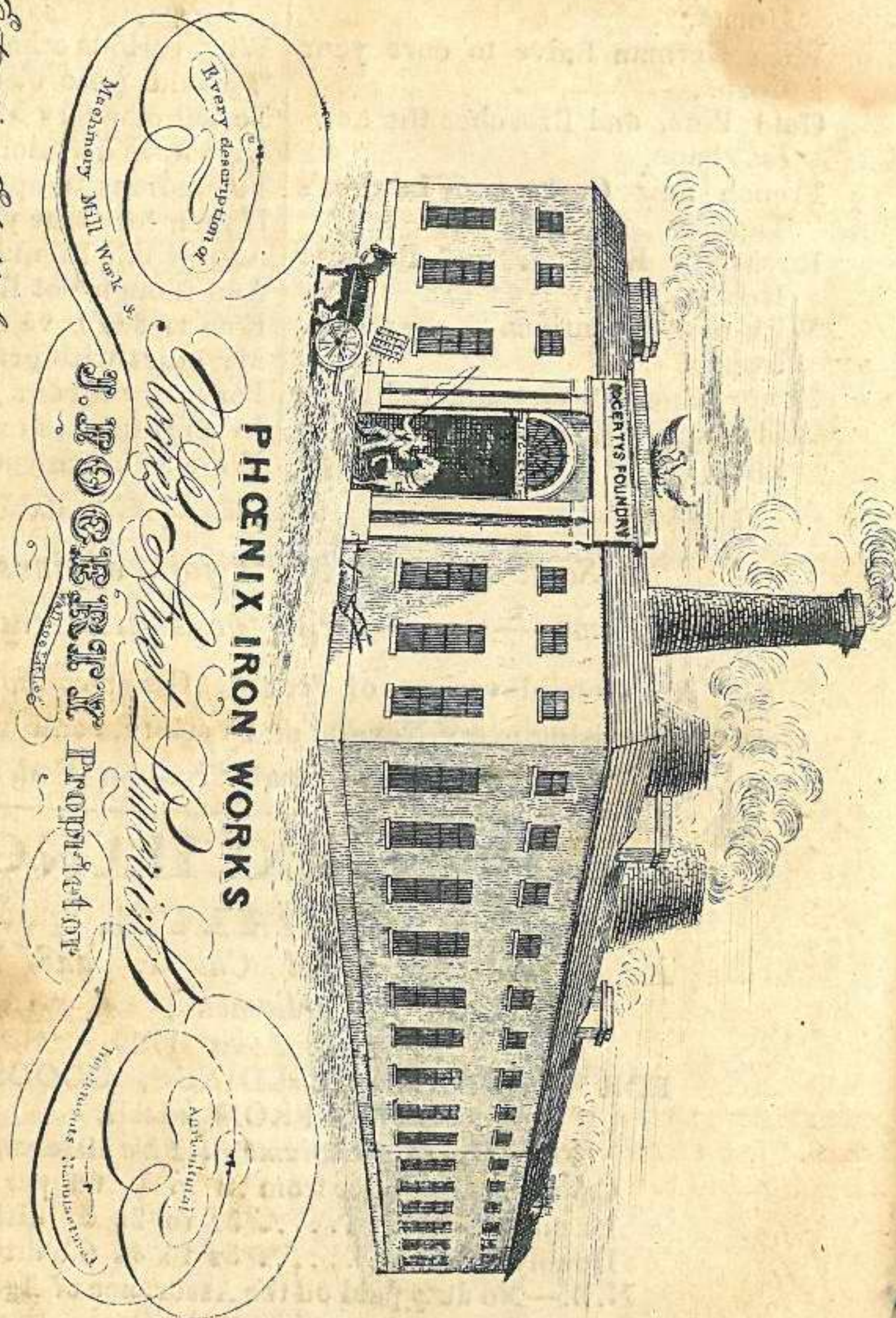
