## PROVINCE OF MUNSTER.

— 0 —

**THIS** is the largest of the four provinces, and occupies the south-western portion of the kingdom. It has Connought on the north, the boundary marked by an irregular line from Galway Bay, through the Sleibh Baughta to the Shannon; Leinster, which is on the north-east, is parted from it by another imaginary and uneven line, commencing at the Shannon, five miles south-west of Banagher, and stretching south-south-east to Carrick-on-Suir, whence the river Suir distinguishes its limits to the sea; the other part is bounded by the Atlantic Ocean. The greatest length of the province westward, from Credan Head in Waterford Harbour, to Dunmore Head, at the extremity of Corkaquiney peninsula, is 143 miles; its greatest breadth southward, in a straight line from Black Head on Galway Bay to the east side of the Baltimore Harbour, is 131 miles; its greatest length south-westward, from the furthest sweep of the little Brosna river to Mizen Head, is 141 miles; its greatest breadth south-eastward, from Black Head to Ballycotton Head, is 106 miles; its length westward, in a direct line over Seariff to the head of Liscanor Bay, is 54 miles; its least breadth southward, across nearly the eastern extremity of Waterford county, does not exceed five miles; and its least breadth southward, across the main body to the indentation of Youghal Harbour, is 62 miles. These measurements are given in English miles, and are exclusive of Islands. The area of the whole province comprises 3,874,613 acres of arable land, 1,893,477 of uncultivated land, 130,415 of plantations, 14,693 of towns, and 151,381 of water; in all 6,064,579 statute acres. This province comprises the counties of Clare, Cork, Kerry, Limerick, Tipperary and Waterford; these are divided into seventy-four baronies and four ridings, and subdivided into eight hundred and twenty-eight parishes. The population of the province will appear in the summary at the end of this article.

**CLARE.**—This is a maritime county, anciently called *Thomond*, signifying 'North Munster,' and deriving its present name from Richard and Thomas De Clare, sons of the Earl of Gloucester, to whom King Edward I. granted the county. It has the dangerous bay called Mul, or Mal Bay, and the Atlantic Ocean on the west; Galway on the north, whence it is parted by an irregular line from Galway Bay through Sleibh Baughta to Lough Derg, between Innis Calthia and Moynoe; on the east it has the county of Tipperary, and on the south the Shannon, which separates it from the counties of Kerry and Limerick. It extends about forty-two miles from north to south, and about sixty-six miles from east to west, and contains 827,994 acres—of which about 455,000 acres are arable land, 296,000 uncultivated land, 8,300 of plantations, 730 of towns, and 67,920 of water. The Sleibh Baughta in the north-east, a cluster of mountains at the opening of Galway Bay on the north-west, one of some eminence south-west of Kilfarboy on the western side, and a few lofty hills in the south above the Shannon, between the lakes formed at the confluence of the river Fergus with the Shannon, serve in those diversify the almost general level of the county. On the eastern side are some inconsiderable lakes, and to the north of Ennis, the superfluous waters of which form the river Fergus. Lead is found in the Sleibh Baughta, veins of copper near Tullogh, twelve miles east of Ennis, iron in Killarboy mountain, and coal beneath the southern hills near the Shannon. Beautiful spars, like those of Derbyshire, have also been collected from different caverns in this county. The chief trade is corn and provisions, but coarse linens and some hosiery are manufactured, and there is a productive fishery. The average rent of land is 11s. 3d. per acre. Few counties are more deficient of wood than Clare, yet few afford more favourable situations for the growth of timber. The most important river of this county is the Shannon, which enters on its eastern confines, and flows round by Killaloe (where it forms the celebrated falls) to Limerick. The Fergus, the Ougarnee, the Ardaraun, the Blackwater, the Clareen, and the Ennistymore, are the other streams to which names are attached; but there are numerous beautiful rivulets that descend from the eminences to fertilize the vales, which possess no distinguishing appellation. The *climate* of this county is cool, humid, and occasionally subject to boisterous winds, but, withal, remarkably conducive to health, and frost or snow are seldom of long continuance. In 1843 there were fifty-seven national schools in the county, attended by about eight thousand children.

**DIVISIONS, POPULATION, REPRESENTATION, &c.**—The number of baronies comprised in the county are eleven, namely, Bunratty Lower, Bunratty Upper, Burren, Clonderlaw, Corcomroe, Ibrickan, Inchiquin, Islands, Moyarta, Tulla Lower, and Tulla Upper. These are divided into eighty parishes. The population of the county, by the census taken in 1841, was males, 144,109; females, 142,285; total, 286,394. The number of houses inhabited, at that period, was, 44,870; uninhabited, 1,048; and houses building, 181. Prior to the Union, Clare sent two representatives to the Irish parliament for the borough of Ennis, which now returns one to the Imperial parliament, and the county two. Those now sitting for the latter are Major William Nugent Macnamara, of Doolin Castle, and Cornelius O'Brien, of Birchfield, Ennistimon, Esquire. Sir Lucius O'Brien, Bart. of Dromoland, is lieutenant and custos rotulorum of the county. The title of Earl of Thomond, derived from this county, was raised to a Marquesate in 1800, in favour of the family of O'Brien, which also derives from the large territory of Inchiquin the titles of Earl and Baron, and from the district of Burren also that of Baron. The title of Earl of Clare is borne by the family of Fitzgibbon.

**CORK.**—This is a beautiful maritime county, one of the most important and the largest in Ireland, extending about seventy miles from Mitchelstown, on the north-east, to Bantry, at the south-west; and from Youghal, at the extreme eastern part, across the county to Ballymackery, on the west, about sixty miles. Its area comprises (by the latest computation) 1,846,333 English acres, of which 1,308,832 are arable land, 465,889 are uncultivated land, 52,180 are woodlands, 6,515 are towns, and 12,867 are water. It is bounded on the north-west by the county of Waterford, on the north by those of Tipperary and Limerick, on the north-west by the county of Kerry, and the sea environs the remaining portion on the west and south-west. It abounds with large and commercially important towns, excellent harbours, rivers, and numerous springs and rivulets. The most considerable river is the Blackwater, which issues from mountains situated on the confines of Kerry. The river Lee, next in magnitude, springs from Lough Lua, situated at the foot of the same mountains. The Ilenn also rises in the same mountains, and runs nearly southward to Skibbereen, and forms the harbour of Baltimore. The river Bandon flows from the mountains bordering on Dunmanway; and the Fen rises in those above Dromoland. The Aubeg, a tributary to the Blackwater, is consecrated to immortality in the pastoral lays of Ossian, by the poetic name of "the gentle Mulla," on whose banks, it is supposed, he composed the principal part of his *Fingian*. There are several chalybeate springs, but none of great medicinal celebrity except those of Malinbeg, which resemble the Bristol waters in taste and temperature, and are reputed to possess the same property. The south-western part of this county is filled with mountains and narrow valleys, and a ridge, called the *Collooney* mountains, proceeds from Mangerton, in the south of Kerry, longitudinally through the county. These are a rich valley terminated by lofty uplands and the Galtic mountains; south of the latter, the country is particularly fertile, with little exception, to the sea. Copper, lead, coal, iron, ochre, clay and *striol*

One are its mineralogical productions. Manganese is abundant and very pure, particularly in the neighbourhood of Ross, the Leap, Nohaval, Castleventry and other places; but it is chiefly worked in the parish of Kilfaughnabeg, near Leap, where it is obtained in large quantities. In Whiddy Island, in Bantry Bay, is found a peculiar kind of black chalk. There are some cotton, linen and woollen factories, but grain, butter and provisions are the staple productions of the county. The fisheries employed, in 1843, 4,639 registered vessels upwards of 23,000 men and boys. The average rent of land is 13s. 7d. an acre. The climate is remarkable for the mildness of its temperature, never reaching those extremes of heat and cold to which the same degree of latitude is subject, even in England. The salubrity of this district has also been decidedly improved by the draining of bogs and swamps. In 1843, there were two hundred and twenty national schools in the county attended by about thirty-six thousand children.

**DIVISIONS, POPULATION, REPRESENTATION, &c.**—Cork is divided into two districts, called the East and West Ridings, which contain twenty-three baronies, namely, Bantry, Barretts, Banymore, Bear, Carbery East (East division), Carbery East (West division), Carbery West (East division), Carbery West (West division), Condal and Clangibbon, Cork, Courceys, Duhallow, Fermoy, Ibane and Barryroe, Imokilly, Kerrycurrihy, Kinalmeaky, Kinnatalloon, Kinsale, Muskerry East, Muskerry West, Orrery and Kilmore. These are divided into two hundred and fifty-four parishes. The population of the county (including the county of the city of Cork) by the census taken in 1841, was males, 420,551; females, 433,567; total, 854,118. The number of houses inhabited, at that period, was 130,283; uninhabited, 5,004; and houses building, 186. Prior to the Union, Cork sent twenty-four representatives to the Irish Parliament; it now returns six to the Imperial Parliament, which are thus distributed, two members for the county at large, the like number for the city of Cork, and one each for the boroughs of Bandon, Kinsale, Mallow, and Youghal. The present county members are Daniel O'Connell, of Derrynane Abbey, q.c. Esquire, and Edmund Burke Roche, of Trabolgar, Esquire. The Earl of Bandon, of Castle Bernard, Bandon, is lieutenant and custos rotulorum for the county. Cork confers the title of Earl upon the senior branch of the noble family of Boyle.

**KERRY.**—This is a maritime and the most westerly county in Ireland, remarkably romantic and exceedingly interesting, but surpassed by many in fertility. By antiquaries the origin of its name is traced to Ciar, the eldest son of Fergus King of Ulster, from whom it was called *Carruidhe* or *Cair Reeght*; that is, the kingdom of Ciar. Some authorities deduce its name from *Cerrigia* or *Ciaruidhe*, the 'Country of Rocks,' from *cerrig*, 'a rock,' and *uidhe*, 'a district on the water.' Some of the early chiefs of this country were called *Hy Cair* or *Cairuidhe*, by contraction O'Connor Kerry, whose descendants were in possession of their ancient patrimony in the beginning of the last century. This county, the fourth in extent, is bounded by the Shannon on the north-east (which separates it from the county of Clare) and by Limerick; on the south and south-east by County Cork, and on its western border roll the waves of the Atlantic, penetrating its shores deeply, and indenting the coast with spacious bays. Its greatest extent from north to south is nearly seventy miles, from east to west at its broadest part, about fifty, and across its northern quarter, near the shores of the Shannon, not more than above ten miles. Its area, including bogs, mountains, wastes, and lakes, 1,186,126 acres. Agriculture, generally speaking, is far more backward in Kerry than in the adjoining county of Cork, from the soil being much inferior. A large portion of the county is mountainous and dreary, but with redeeming features of the romantic. From the altitude of some of its mountains their summits are enveloped in perpetual fog. The loftiest mountain in Ireland, Gurrau Tuel, is in Kerry, and rises above the sea to the height of 3,410 feet. The rivers are numerous, but none of great length: those which may be named as the principal are the Feale, separating two counties of Kerry and Limerick; the Gale or Galey, from the north-east; the Brick, from the south; the Madinagh or Maine, from Castle Island and the Fleskroe, which falls into that river; the Lee, from near Tralee; the Flesto, from the eastern boundary of the county, flowing into the lower Lake of Killarney; the Fartagh and Ee, which rise in the Iveragh mountains; and the Roughty, which empties itself into the Bay of Kenmare. The Great Blackwater is a boundary river between this county and that of Cork, and flows into Youghal Bay; and the Cara and the Laune are streams which lose their waters in Castlemaine harbour. The lakes in the mountainous regions are numerous, but few are of large dimensions: the principal are the celebrated 'Lakes of Killarney'—three in number, which are connected by straits or short rivers. They are distinguished by the names of the Upper Lake, the Torc, and the Lower Lake. The last is six miles in length, and of great breadth with mountains of the richest grandeur on one side, which is increased by the contrast of the level shore on the other, and overspread with islands of the most luxuriant beauty. Torc Lake, which, if possible, is still more picturesque, is separated from the former by a richly-wooded peninsula. But the wildest sublimity is that of the Upper Lake, about two miles and a half in length, and entirely surrounded by mountains. We must leave it to the delighted tourist to furnish a more detailed description of the fairy scenes that may be enjoyed up to the 'Lakes of Killarney.' We can but briefly refer to the other lakes of the county. Lough Currane, embellished with several islands, is near Ballinskellig Bay; Lough Scall is about half way between Tralee and Dingle; Lough Cara near Castlemaine harbour, and Lough Quinlan near that of Kilmacalogue. The Devil's Punishment Bowl is a very deep hollow, near the summit of Maryerton Mountain, fifteen hundred feet high, its surface of water forming a succession of cataracts down the mountain side; at the foot of which is the secluded and picturesque Lake of Kittane. There are several medicinal springs in the county: those most celebrated for their healing virtues are Killarney, Inveragh, Fellswell, Dingle, Castlemaine, and Tralee Spas—their names indicate their locality. There is also a saline spring at Magheribeg in Corkaguiny barony, which is covered twice a day by the tide, and oozes through a clear white sand. The southern baronies abound in ores of iron, lead, and copper; marble is worked at Tralee, and at Kerry Head fine amethysts have been found in the cliffs. The employment of the population of Kerry is chiefly tillage, the management of the dairy, and the fisheries. In 1843 above one thousand vessels, and nearly six thousand men and boys, were occupied on the waters. The average rent of land is 6s. 1d. per acre. The climate is mild, and though moist, from its vicinity to the ocean and the height of the mountains, and the extent of the bogs, it is still salubrious. Several trees, which are deemed indigenous to warmer latitudes, particularly the beautiful arbutus, grow here naturally to great size and beauty, and, in some instances, cultivation extends seven hundred feet and more up the sides of mountains. In September, 1843, there were eighty-four national schools in this county, attended by fourteen thousand children.

**DIVISIONS, POPULATION, REPRESENTATION, &c.**—The number of baronies comprised in the county are eighteen, namely, Clanmaurice, Corkaguiny, Dunkerron, Glenarought, Iraghticonnor, Iveragh, Magunihy, and Trughsnacmy. These are divided into eighty-seven parishes. The population of the county, by the census taken in 1841, was males, 147,307; females, 146,573; total, 293,880. The number of houses inhabited, at that period, was, 46,628; uninhabited, 1,434; and houses building, 169. Prior to the Union, Kerry sent eight representatives to the Irish parliament, viz.—two knights of the shire, and two members each for the boroughs of Tralee, Dingle, and Ardfert; but since that period its sole representatives have been one for Tralee and two for the county at large; those gentlemen at present sitting for the latter are Morgan John O'Connell, of Grena Killarney, Esquire, and the Hon. William Browne, 89, Jermyn-street, London. Derrynane Abbey, the seat of the present Earl O'Connell, Esquire, is in this county. The Earl of Kenmare, of Castle Rosse, is lieutenant and custos rotulorum of the county. Kerry confers the inferior titles of Baron and Earl on the Marquess of Lansdowne, who also enjoys the titles of Viscount Clanmaurice and Baron Lixnaw and Dunkerron in the peerage of Ireland, derived from districts in this county.

**LIMERICK.**—This county is bounded on the north by the estuary of the Shannon, which separates it from the county of Clare; on the east by Tipperary; on the south by Cork county; and by that of Kerry on the west. Its extent from east to west is about fifty miles, and from north to south about thirty-two; comprising 680,832 acres, including bogs, mountains and waste. Limerick can boast of a large portion of some of the finest land in Ireland. The soil is a rich, mellow, crumbling, sandy loam, and is applicable to every purpose of culture. The average rent of land is 18s. 8d. an acre. Pasturage is more attended to than tillage: large numbers of live stock, and great quantities of agricultural produce are exported from this county. Limerick county is watered by several important streams, the following are the principal—The Maig, or Maigue, which receives a number of rivulets in its course to the Shannon, falls from the Galtic mountains south of Kilfaunan, and from the high lands which mark the boundaries of Limerick and Cork, the two branches uniting five miles north-west of Kilmallock, join the Shannon at Carigagunell. The Deel springs from two sources in the same highlands as the preceding rivers, and falls into the Shannon at Askeyton. All the rivers of the interior are branches of the Shannon; besides those already named, there are the Daun, or Morning Star; the Mulcaine; the Funcheon, and the Feale—the last named being a boundary stream for some distance on the south-west border. There is a coal mine at the western extremity of the county, but turf is the general fuel of the inhabitants. Lead occurs in the limestone mountains above Deel, near Askeyton, and fine slate near Abbyfeale, on the borders of the county. The *climate* of Limerick is remarkably good, and the weather less variable than in any other county in Ireland. The entire face of the country, notwithstanding its great natural fertility, presents a denuded appearance, from the paucity of woodlands and hedgerows, those great embellishments of scenery. In 1843 there were sixty-eight national schools in operation in this county, attended by more than 9,000 children.

**DIVISIONS, POPULATION, REPRESENTATION, &c.**—The number of baronies comprised in the county are twelve, namely, Clanwilliam, Connellow Lower, Connellow Upper, Coonagh, Coshlea, Coshma, Glenquin, Kenry, Owneybeg, Pubblebrien, Shanid, and Smallcounty; and the liberties of Kilmallock and the County of the City of Limerick. These are divided into one hundred and thirty-two parishes. The population of the county (including Limerick City and County), by the census taken in 1841, was males, 161,997; females, 168,032; total, 330,029. The number of houses inhabited, at that period, was 48,127, uninhabited, 1,568; and houses building, 113. Prior to the Union, Limerick sent six representatives to the Irish Parliament, namely, two for the county at large, and two for each of the boroughs of Askeaton and Kilmallock; since that period the two members returned to the Imperial Parliament for the city, and the like number for the county at large, have been its only representatives: those gentlemen at present sitting for the county are William Smith O'Brien, of Cahermoyle, Esquire, and Caleb Powell, of Clanshavy, Esquire. The Earl of Dunraven, Adair Castle, county of Limerick, is lieutenant and custos rotulorum of the county. Limerick confers the titles of Earl and Viscount on the family of Pery.

**TIPPERARY.**—This is an inland county, bounded on the east by King's and Queen's counties, and that of Kilkenny; on the south by that of Waterford; on the west by those of Cork, Limerick, and Clare, the boundary of which latter is the Shannon and Lough Derg; and on the north it is bounded by Galway and a portion of King's county. Its length from north to south is sixty-six miles, and its greatest breadth is about forty. Its area comprises about 1,061,731 acres, of which more than 11,000 acres are covered with water, and nearly 200,000 are bog, mountain, and waste land. The county is for the most part level, possessing few mountains of great altitude. The soil of the level portion is remarkably rich, especially the track called the 'Golden Vale,' which is a calcareous loam. The average rent of the land is 17s. 8d. an acre. Copper and lead ores have been discovered in various districts, and coal is abundant. Many of the mines are of great magnitude, and wrought to great advantage. Slates are obtained in different parts, the quarries in Killenau being prolific and valuable. The principal rivers are the Shannon, the Suir, and the Nore. The progress of the Shannon has been already noticed. The Suir passes through the length of the county, from north to south, and receives in its course numerous tributary streams. The Nore, which rises in the Slievebloom mountains, flows only about ten miles through this county, on its road to Kilkenny. There are very few woods, but this defect is being remedied by the numerous plantations rapidly rising around the mansions of the gentry. The *climate* of the county is mild, and considered remarkably salubrious. In 1843 there were one hundred and eighteen national schools in the county, attended by sixteen thousand four hundred children or more.

**DIVISIONS, POPULATION, REPRESENTATION, &c.**—Tipperary is divided into ridings, which are sub-divided into twelve baronies—these are Clanwilliam, Eliogarty, Iffa and Offa East, Iffa and Offa West, Ikerin, Kilnamanagh Lower, Kilnamanagh Upper, Middlethird, Ormond Lower, Ormond Upper, Owney and Arra, and Slieverdagh. These comprise one hundred and ninety-three parishes. The population of the county, by the census taken in 1841, was males, 216,650; females, 218,903; total, 435,553. The number of houses inhabited, at that period, was, 66,384; uninhabited, 2,020; and houses building, 246. Prior to the Union, Tipperary sent eight representatives to the Irish parliament, viz.—two for the county, and two each for the boroughs of Cashel, Clonmel, and Felthard; but since that period Cashel and Clonmel have returned one member each to the Imperial parliament, and the county at large two; the gentlemen at present sitting for the latter are Nicholas Maher, of Tertulla House, Thurles, Esquire, and the Hon. Robert Otway Cave, Jermyn-street, St. James', London. The Earl of Donoughmore, of Knocklofty, is lieutenant of the county, and the Hon. Francis Aldborough Prittie, of Corville, is custos rotulorum. The title of Earl of Tipperary is enjoyed by his Royal Highness Prince Adolphus Frederick, Duke of Cambridge.

**WATERFORD.**—This is a maritime county, lying on the shore of Saint George's Channel, between the county of Wexford on the east, and that of Cork on the west, having the counties of Tipperary and Kilkenny on the north. Its extent from east to west is about forty-five miles, and its breadth, at the narrowest part (from Dungarvan Bay to the northern edge abutting on Tipperary), is little more than ten miles; while from Tramore Bay to the river Suir, near Clonmel, the breadth is nearly thirty. The surface of the county comprises 461,553 statute acres, of which full 343,500 are cultivated. The north-western portion, which embraces nearly two-fifths of the county, consists of mountains and hills; and the district between the Blackwater river and Dungarvan Bay is likewise exceedingly mountainous. The remainder of the county is tolerably level; and the soil of the plains and the valleys is rich and fruitful. In an agricultural point of view, the county may be divided into three classes, two-thirds being under tillage, and the remaining third equally divided between meadow and pasture and unimproved mountain and bog. Wheat, barley, bere, oats and potatoes are the general crops, except in the more elevated lands, where they are confined to the two last named. The average rent of land is 12s. 6d. an acre. The geology of the county exhibits no great variety, the whole being composed of clay-slate, sand-stone and some limestone. In the rocks, north of Lismore, and some other parts, iron, copper and lead ores are of frequent occurrence. The Mining Company of Ireland have (or had) copper mines at Knockmahon worked extensively, and with the most approved machinery. The fishery is a productive branch of industry, and the coast abounds with various shell-fish. Manufactures are very inconsiderable, but the import and export trade through the port of Waterford is very extensive. The principal rivers are the Suir, the Blarney, the Blackwater, and the Bride—they are all navigable streams, and of vast importance to the districts through which they flow. The first falls into Waterford Harbour; the second falls into Youghal Bay, and the Bride is a tributary to the Blackwater. In the barony of Gaultie are chalybeate springs; there is another at Clonmel, on the Waterford side of the Suir, and others between Dungarvan and Youghal. There are also some vitriol

spas at Modeligo and Cross. The *climate* is exceedingly variable, and the prevailing south and south-west winds, by which the coast is assailed, are, at times, exceedingly violent. In the more sheltered situations, the climate is genial and healthful, and vegetation is clothed in its most pleasing garb. In 1843 there were fifty-two national schools in the county, attended by seven thousand five hundred children.

**DIVISIONS, POPULATION, REPRESENTATION, &c.**—The number of baronies comprised in the county are seven, namely, Coshmore and Coshbride, Decies-within-Drum, Decies-without-Drum, Gaultiere, Glenahiry, Middlethird, and Upperthird. These are divided into eighty-two parishes. The population of the county (including the county of the city of Waterford), by the census taken in 1841, was males, 95,576; females, 100,611; total, 196,187. The number of houses inhabited, at that period, was, 28,345; uninhabited, 931; and houses building, 128. Prior to the Union, Waterford sent eight representatives to the Irish parliament, viz. two for the county, and two each for the boroughs of Dungarvon, Lismore, and Tallow; but since that period the members returned to the Imperial parliament have been two for the city of Waterford, one for the borough of Dungarvan, and two for the county at large; the gentlemen at present sitting for the latter are William Villiers Stuart, of Cappoquin, Esquire, and the Hon. Robert Shapland Carew, of Woodstown. Lord Stuart de Decies, of Drumana is the lieutenant and custos rotulorum for the county; and W. V. Stuart, Esq. M.P. before named, is vice-lieutenant. This county confers the title of Marquess upon the family of Beresford, and Earl upon that of Talbot. The barony of Decies, in this county, gives the title of Baron to a branch of the Beresford family.

**EDUCATION.**—The number of national schools in operation in Munster, in 1843, was 600, attended by about 91,000 children. The number of persons in this province (at five years old and upwards) who could neither read nor write, at the above period, was 1,266,833; the number who could read only, was 271,139; and those who could both read and write numbered 552,740.

**REPRESENTATION.**—This province is represented in the Imperial Parliament by twenty-six members, which are thus distributed—two each for the above six counties, two each for the cities of Cork, Limerick, and Waterford, and one each for the boroughs of Cashel, Cloumel, Dungarvan, Ennis, Kinsale, Mallow, Tralee, and Youghal.

## ADARE,

**OR ADAIR**, is a post town and parish, partly in the barony of Kenry, and partly in that of Upper Connello, but chiefly in the barony of Coshma, county of Limerick, 140 miles s.w. from Dublin, and 11 s.w. from Limerick; situated on the western bank of the river Mague, over which is a fine bridge of fourteen arches. This little town is strikingly beautiful, both from its position, embellished by the seat of the Earl of Dunraven, Adare Castle, and the fine ruins by which it is environed. The remains of the Castle of the Desmonds, with its ivy-decked battlements, rise from the margin of the river; while the ruins of a venerable abbey give a solemn interest to the opposite bank. On the south side of the bridge stands all that is left of the White or Augustinian abbey, founded by John Earl of Kildare in 1315. The marble cloisters are in good preservation—so is the lofty steeple; and this interesting remnant is beautifully adorned with ivy and the graceful foliage of trees. At the termination of the town is a small frag-

ment of the abbey of the Trinitarians, endowed for the redemption of Christian slaves. Sir H. Wallop was the fortunate recipient, from the hands of Elizabeth, of the large possessions of this foundation. In the vicinity of Adare are the remains also of a Franciscan abbey, founded in 1644, by Thomas Earl of Kildare, rich in arboraceous beauty. The river Mague is navigable for small vessels, and the channel is much improved by the Commissioners of the Shannon Navigation; and when the Shannon line of railway is completed, Adare, being only six miles distant, will derive great advantage therefrom. The Earl Dunraven the proprietor of this town, fitted up the nave and choir of the Franciscan abbey as the parochial church. There is a Catholic chapel, and one for Wesleyans. A fever hospital, a dispensary, and an endowed school are the principal charities. Fairs, March 28th and October 14th. The parish of Adare contained, in 1841, 4,902 inhabitants, and the town 1,095 of that number.

**BALLINCOLLIG,**

A VILLAGE, in the parish of Carrigrohane, barony of Barretts, county of Cork, is five miles from Cork, situated on the main road between that city and Killarney. Its chief importance is derived from the extensive gunpowder mills belonging to Mr. Tobin, and the cavalry and infantry barracks, which are of great magnitude. The country around is in a high state of cultivation, and is besides delightfully picturesque. Near to the village are the ruins of Ballincollig castle, once

a structure of considerable extent. The numerous seats of the gentry, of which many occupy charming situations, add to the beauty of this district. The places of worship are the parish church of Carrigrohane, a plain structure, about a mile from the village, and a Roman Catholic chapel. A national school and a dispensary are the principal charitable institutions. Ballincollig (North and South) contained, in 1841, 1,721 inhabitants.

**BANDON,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF INISHANNON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

BANDON, or BANDON BRIDGE, is a large and respectable market town, and a borough both corporate and parliamentary, partly in the parish of Kilbrogan, barony of Kinalmeaky, but chiefly in that of Ballymodan, barony of East Carbery, county of Cork, 174 miles s.w. from Dublin, and 19 s.w. from Cork; pleasantly situated on the banks of the river from which it derives its name, and is the terminus of the Bandon and Cork railway. This town was founded by the celebrated Richard Boyle, first Earl of Cork, about the year 1610; by his interest it was incorporated, and several charters were obtained, granting to the inhabitants many privileges and advantages. At one period Bandon was chiefly inhabited by English Protestants, who walled and fortified the town, and built two churches and market houses. The walls were, however, demolished by the Irish in 1689, for which violence no Catholics were, for a long time, permitted to reside in the town. The settlers being an industrious and economical people, Bandon soon began to flourish and increase, till at length the streets within the walls becoming incapable of containing its population, several additional ones were built in various parts of the suburbs, and it has continued to improve in appearance and increase in wealth ever since. The Roman Ca-

tholics at the present day out number considerably the Protestants. The principal part of the present town lies in a valley, environed with lofty hills. Under the various names of Main-street, Boyle-street, and Shannon-street, it extends on the south side for about a mile and a half parallel with the river, and on the north for about half that distance. Many of the habitations are built on the acclivity of the hills on both sides of the river, which are agreeably wooded and embellished with several mansions and villas that impart to the environs a pleasing appearance. The old town stands on the estate of the Duke of Devonshire; that part called Irish town is the property of the Earl of Shannon, and the western portion belongs to the Earls of Cork and Bandon. In addition to the corn and provision trade, there are several linen and woollen manufactories, a cotton-spinning factory, two breweries, the like number of extensive distilleries, several tanneries, maltings, and flour mills; a branch of the Provincial Bank of Ireland, a savings' bank, and two hotels. The shopkeepers carry on a very extensive retail trade, are numerous, and highly respectable. The inhabitants were incorporated by charter of James I. James II. granted a new one, and Charles II. conferred lands on the cor-

**BRUFF AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

BRUFF is a pleasant post village, in the parish of  
its name, barony of Coshma, county of Limerick, situ-  
ated on the mail road from Cork, 15 miles s. from the  
former city, and 47 N. from the latter; seated on the  
banks of the river Dawn, in a delightful and fertile  
part of the country. Cahir Guillamore, the elegant  
seat of Lord Guillamore, is near the town, and in the  
neighbourhood are the seats, villas, and mansions of  
many of the gentry; while the ruins of several castles  
add to the picturesque character of the scenery. The  
town, which consists of one long street, with several  
lanes branching from it, was formerly the property of  
the Hartstonge family, and now forms part of the Li-  
merick estates. The constabulary force have a barrack  
here, and one for the military is about to be erected.  
In a neat court-house general sessions are held in  
January and June, and petty sessions every alternate

Wednesday. John N. Barron, Esq. of Charleville, is  
the stipendiary magistrate. The trade of Bruff is mainly  
of a local and retail character; a corn mill and a good  
hotel are, perhaps, the most prominent branches.

The places of worship are the parish church, an  
ancient structure, and a Roman Catholic chapel, a spa-  
cious and rather handsome stone building. A com-  
modious school, called the 'Adelaide School,' was  
erected in 1843, the site of ground having been given  
by Lord Carbery, who also built the walls and offices,  
and it was completed by subscriptions raised through  
the exertions of the Rev. Godfrey Massy, the vicar.  
A school, under the National Board, and a dispensary,  
are the other principal public institutions. Fairs, May  
24th, October 23rd, and November 18th and 28th. The  
parish contained, in 1841, 2,900 inhabitants, and the  
village 1,398 of that number.

**CAHER**

IS a respectable market town and parish, in the barony  
of Iffa and Offa West, county of Tipperary, 110 miles  
s.w. from Dublin, 52 N. by E. of Cork, 40 W.N.W. of  
Waterford, 10 west of Clonmel, the like distance south  
of Cashel, and 15 S.E. of Tipperary, seated on the river  
Suir. It is a rising and beautifully situated town; the  
houses are tastefully and substantially built, the streets  
kept in the neatest order, and none of that squalid  
misery seen unhappily in some other places is here to  
be met with. The Earl of Glengall, the benevolent  
patron and proprietor of the town and his amiable  
countess, are ever active in improving the moral and  
physical condition of the poor, and contributing largely  
to their comforts. Caher House, the seat of the Earl,  
contiguous to the town, is a stately mansion, and the  
demesne extends for more than two miles on both sides  
the river. The park is finely planted and well stocked  
with deer: and in a secluded part of it is a picturesque  
retreat of modern erection, called the 'Cottage,' greatly  
admired for the surpassing beauty of its situation. The

manufacture of linens, and also of straw plat, which  
prevailed here to some extent, have declined, and the  
staple trade is now corn and flour—for the manufacture  
of the latter there are in the town and immediate  
neighbourhood some of the largest mills in the country.  
The trade of this place and neighbourhood will be much  
improved when the railway from Tipperary to Carrick-  
on-Suir is completed; and which it is intended shall  
communicate with the Upper Shannon by a branch  
from Tipperary to Killaloe. The government of the  
town is vested in the local magistrates who meet in  
petty sessions every alternate Thursday; and a manorial  
court, in which debts are recoverable under £10.  
held by the seneschal every six weeks.

The church, which was rebuilt in 1817, is a spacious  
stone structure, in the later English style, with a  
embattled tower, surmounted by a finely proportioned  
spire. The interior of the church, which is finished in  
a handsome, chaste style, may vie in appearance with  
any church in the kingdom. The Roman Catholic

**CASTLE CONNELL AND O'BRIEN'S BRIDGE.**

**CASTLE CONNELL**, or **STRADBALLY**, is a neat post village and parish, partly in the barony of Owney and Arra, county of Tipperary, and partly in that of Clanwilliam, county of Limerick; seated on the banks of the Shannon, a quarter of a mile to the left of the main road between Limerick and Dublin, at a distance of 7½ miles N.E. from the former city, and 114 s.w. by w. from the latter. The ruins of an ancient castle, formerly one of the strongholds of the O'Briens, give an interest to the place. Castle-Connell is the residence of the Earl of Clare, who possesses a spacious demesne; it is also the seat of Lord Massy, and there are many other elegant seats around. The only remains of the ancient and strong fortress of Castle-Connell are the ruins of the Tower, and fragments of some other parts, situated on an isolated rock. The remains of the friary, founded by Renald de Burgh in 1291, for Franciscans, now form some out-offices to a newly-erected cottage. Numerous visitants frequent Castle Connell in the summer, to enjoy the sport of fishing in the Shannon. The salmon leap and waterfall of Doonas must be visited for their beauties to be appreciated; they adjoin the seat of Lord Massy.

There is a chalybeate spring in the vicinity very salutary in many complaints. In a small court-house petty sessions are held every alternate Thursday. The constabulary force has a barrack in the village.

The church was erected in 1809, and greatly enlarged in 1830; it is now a handsome cruciform edifice, with a lofty octagonal spire. The Roman Catholic chapel is a large plain structure. A dispensary, and some public free schools, are the principal charitable institutions. Fairs, April 20th, June 1st, July 16th, and October 4th. Population of the village 1,100.

**O'BRIEN'S BRIDGE** is a village and parish, in the barony of Tulla, county of Clare, about two miles from Castle Connell, situated on the Shannon. The bridge, bestriding the river, and from which the place takes its name, had formerly fourteen arches, no two of which were turned alike; but the Shannon commissioners are rebuilding the greater part of it, in consequence of its dilapidated state, and the arches will be reduced to twelve. There is an extensive grain mill here, belonging to Messrs. Denniston and Co., worked both by steam and water power, which, besides employing a considerable number of hands, is of great convenience.



to the inhabitants of the village and neighbourhood. The parish church, a neat building of stone, was erected in 1822. A school, under the Church Education Society, is the only other public establishment. Near

the village is Montpellier, a strongly-impregnated sulphurous spring, held in estimation for its efficacy in curing cutaneous diseases. Fairs, July 25th and November 7th. Population 435.

## DINGLE,

**DINGLE-I-COUCH**, is a sea-port, market town (formerly a parliamentary borough), and parish, in the county of Kerry, 210 miles s. w. from Dublin, 93 s. w. from Limerick, 100 n. w. from Cork, and 27 w. by s. from Tralee. This, the most westerly town in the United Kingdom, is situated on the south side of a peninsula comprising the barony of Corkaguiney, which is twenty-four miles in length and eight in breadth; on the south it is washed by the bay of Dingle, on the north by Tralee bay, and shoots like a tongue into the Atlantic. It contains about twenty populous parishes, is remarkable for its fertility, and, at one time, celebrated for the manufacture of a species of linen called Bandle cloth, which has become extinct. The harbour is excellent and within three hours' sail of the Atlantic Ocean; at the entrance to it there is, at low water, thirty feet depth, gradually diminishing to not less than twelve feet in any part; the channel, which is tolerably straight, runs along the western shore. A large field for industry here presents itself to the active and intelligent, as no spot can be better calculated for an extensive corn trade, the home fisheries, the linen manufacture, and the Newfoundland trade. The decline, or rather the almost total loss of trade in the west and south-west parts of the counties of Cork and Kerry, comprehending a great extent of sea-coast, with many excellent harbours formed by nature, and favourable to unlimited commerce, is much to be lamented. Of this Dingle is a striking instance; for in the reign of Queen Elizabeth it was a place of trade and consequence, much frequented by foreigners, and particularly noticed by Sir Walter Raleigh for its many advantages. In the neighbourhood strata of coal and copper were some

years ago discovered, and some efforts were made, but unsuccessfully, to render these mineral treasures available. Although a market and corporate town, Dingle in its commercial and municipal consequence, is now little more than a fishing village. It was incorporated by Elizabeth, in the 28th year of her reign, under the style of 'the Sovereign, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the town of Dingle-I-Couch.' The powers of the corporation were never extensive, and they have now merged, together with the jurisdiction of the sovereign, in the county magistrates, who hold petty sessions every Thursday, and to them the government of the town may be said to be confided. The court-house, in which the magistrates assemble, is a new and substantial stone building, situated on the Mall. The borough sent two representatives to the Irish parliament until the Union, when it was disfranchised.

The church, erected on the site of an ancient abbey dedicated to the Virgin Mary, is destitute of anything externally ornamental. The Catholic chapel is remarkable for its simplicity and elegance, and is very capacious. Adjoining the chapel is a convent for nuns of the order of Presentation, who, with praiseworthy solicitude, superintend, gratuitously, the education of a considerable number of female children. There are also national and parochial schools, and a dispensary. The market is on Saturday. There are no chartered fairs, but one is held on the market day for cattle, sheep, pigs, &c. which is well attended, and the town presents on this occasion a comparatively bustling scene, as contrasted with its usual quietude. The parish of Dingle contained, in 1841, 6,205 inhabitants, inclusive of 3,386 returned for the town.

# KILMALLOCK,

**A**N ancient corporate, post, and market town and parish, forming a liberty, in the county of Limerick, 138 miles s. w. from Dublin, 43 n. from Cork, and 20 s. from Limerick, situated at the junction of the roads leading to Tipperary, Limerick, and Charleville, and on the western bank of a small stream called the Lubach. Though now in a ruinous condition, this place prominently figured in the annals of Irish warfare, and the remains of its walls, together with those of many strong castles, ruined monasteries, decayed churches, and spacious private dwellings, still remain to testify its former magnificence. It has been called, in allusion to its present appearance, the 'Irish Balbec.' In 1598 it was invested by the Irish, but the Earl of Ormonde compelled them to relinquish the siege. In the tumultuous times of 1641, the possession of this town was sharply contested by the insurgents. Kilmallock formerly enjoyed distinctive municipal privileges, and with its extensive liberties constituted a separate county. Its consequence and trade are now annihilated; the shops

are few and small, and a respectable inn, kept by Mr. Gilbertson, is the principal business establishment. The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul was formerly collegiate, and is an ancient and spacious structure, in variously mixed styles of architecture, in a sad dilapidated state; of the tomb-memorials some are interesting, and, in ages past, doubtless, were elegant; one to the family of Coote is still handsome. The Roman Catholic chapel is a good sized building, erected in 1814, and subsequently enlarged. A dispensary, supported by subscription, is the principal charity. In the immediate neighbourhood of Kilmallock is Mount Coote, the delightful property of Captain Chas. Coote; there are also several other seats in the vicinity. A charter for a market still exists, but is not made available. Fairs, February 21st, March 25th, Tuesday in Whitsun week, July 6th, November 8th, and December 4th. The population of the liberty of Kilmallock, in 1841, was 3,126, including 1,408 inhabitants for the town.

# KILRUSH,

**A** SEA-PORT, market town, and parish, in the barony of Moyarta, county of Clare, 176 miles s. w. from Dublin, 117 n. w. from Cork, 53 w. from Limerick, 26 s. w. from Ennis, 18 s. from Miltown, and 10 e. s. e. from Kilkee; situated on the northern shore of the estuary of the Shannon, about fifteen miles from its mouth, having an excellent harbour, and possessing other local advantages. The town, which is neatly built and annually improving, consists of a market square intersected from east to west by a spacious street, well flagged, with smaller thoroughfares branching off. The pier, which is of very solid construction,

is protected by a sea wall of great strength, and is very commodious, affording every facility for landing passengers from the steam vessels, which ply regularly between this place and Limerick, as well as for agricultural and commercial uses. Kilrush, besides its own domestic business and extensive fishery, enjoys benefits resulting from genteel families resorting to the bathing season. At the bottom of Francis Hall, the two principal hotels—well arranged establishments for the accommodation of families or the occasional gentleman: one of these, Williams', is a well-kept house. Thirty years ago the whole corn trade of this



## LIMERICK AND ITS VICINITY.

**L**IMERICK is a city and county of itself, the see of a bishop, and a considerable commercial port, 120 miles s.w. from Dublin, 84 n.w. from Waterford, 64 n. from Cork, the like distance n.e. from Tralee, 53 e. from Kiltrush, and 75 e. from Dunmore Head, an extreme apex of Clare county, protruding into the Atlantic Ocean. This ancient city, eligibly and delightfully situated on the eastern bank of the noble Shannon, is supposed to have been founded by YUORUS, in the year 155, while, by some writers, it is said to have been the *Regia* of Ptolemy. It was called *Rosse-de-Nailleagh* in the Annals of Multifernan; and is believed to have been the place described under the name of *Lumneach*, as forming the western extremity of the southern half of the island, as divided A. M. 2870 and 3970, which name is supposed to have been modified to its present designation. Saint Patrick is said to have visited it about the middle of the fifth century; but the first authentic records of Limerick notice it as a Danish settlement; by that people it was first plundered in 812. The Danes of Limerick did not embrace Christianity until the 11th century, and in the following one they elected their first bishop. Before this period, however, it was a place of commerce and was much frequented by foreign merchants. The English took possession of Limerick in the year 1174; and, as a proof of the early importance of the city, in the year 1197, and in the ninth year of the reign of King Richard, he granted a charter to the citizens to elect a mayor, which honour was not obtained by the citizens of London till ten years after that period; nor had Dublin and Cork a mayor till the 13th century. The city was originally walled, and deemed the strongest fortress in this kingdom, having the advantage of not being commanded by adjacent heights, and it has sustained some memorable sieges. In the year 1690 King William brought his forces against it, but withdrew them without accomplishing its reduction; in the following year it was again invested by General Ginckle, who, after an obstinate resistance, compelled the garrison to surrender, on honourable terms of capitulation. During the siege the Irish fought gallantly, and repulsed the English several times; but the garrison was grown weary of the war, and on the 23d of September, 1691, an amicable intercourse was opened between the two contending parties. In 1703 an act was passed excluding Roman Catholic strangers from residing in the city, and requiring from the permanent inhabitants of that persuasion sureties for their allegiance under pain of expulsion; but in the year 1724 these illiberal and arbitrary restrictions were removed. In 1760 Limerick was declared to be no longer a fortress, and the dismantling of its walls and other defences was then commenced and proceeded with, as the extension of the various improvements rendered the removal of old buildings necessary. On the breaking out of the American war, the loyalty of this city and district was manifested by the alacrity with which the volunteer corps were embodied under the names of the 'Limerick Union,' the 'Loyal Limerick Volunteers,' and the 'Limerick Volunteers.' After the termination of the contest with America, the improvements in, and extension of the city, were renewed with energy, unretarded by the occasional alarms of insurrection, which distracted some of the neighbouring districts. In 1803 a design was formed, by those engaged in Emmett's conspiracy, to take the city by surprise, and with so much secrecy was the plan conducted, that it was unknown to the military commandant until the evening preceding the day of intended attack, when the proper measures were taken to frustrate the design. The most correct idea of this city, as to its scale when enclosed with walls and fortifications, may be formed by a comparison of its then contracted state with its present extent, population, and magnificence, as no town in the kingdom has so much increased in size and splendour, in the same period, as the city of Limerick, and its improvement is still progressive. This city is now composed of three parts, named the Irish Town, English Town (the latter situated on an island formed by the Shannon), and Newtown-Pery, which latter may properly be termed the court end, as in this part of the town the streets are spacious, uniform, and, intersecting each other at right angles,

and the houses are finished in the neatest style of modern architecture. This portion of the city was erected by the exertions of the late Lord Pery, whose name it bears, and it is the fashionable as well as favourite residence of the opulent.

The public structures, for the most part, are handsome and commodious, and some elegant and ornamental. The Custom House is a fine building of hewn stone; its front is embellished with fluted pilasters and capitals, and on each side is a piazza. The Court House is also a spacious noble building, with a handsome portico in front. The Commercial Buildings, situated in Rutland-street, are large and elegant. The Chamber of Commerce, in George-street, is an elegant and convenient edifice, in which are the news-rooms, library, offices, &c. of the body so called. This institution comprises in its members the principal merchants of the city; was formed in the year 1808, and incorporated, by royal charter, in 1815, 'for the promotion and protection of the trade of Limerick.' The corporation consists of president, vice-president, and members. The Exchange, which was erected in the year 1778, is a spacious handsome building, in which is a fine council chamber, the entire supported by seven stone columns of the Tuscan order. The County Gaol is generally considered to be one of the most complete prisons in Ireland. It consists of a large centre, containing the governor's apartments, a dispensary, a chapel, a committee-room, and five detached prisons, each communicating with the chapel on the second floor, by ornamental cast-iron bridges; belonging to each compartment of the prison are two fine airy yards, the whole of which are overlooked from the centre building. The County Infirmary, facing the gaol, is a spacious and convenient structure; so is the County Hospital, on the Cork new road. Barrington's Hospital, at St. George's quay, is a highly ornamental building, and cost £4,000. It was founded by Sir Joseph Barrington and his sons in 1829, for the relief of the poor of their native city; was opened for patients in 1831, and is the only general hospital in the city. The Wellesley Bridge, called after the late Marquess of Wellesley, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, was commenced in 1821, and opened to the public, by the Marquess of Normandy, in his lord lieutenancy in August, 1835, when his excellency was the first person who passed over it on horseback: it consists of five large arches, and of a swivel drawbridge at the south side; it is a very handsome stone structure, and cost about £80,000. There are barracks for cavalry, artillery, and infantry, all commodious and in airy situations. The city is the head quarters of the Limerick military district and of the constabulary force. A list of the several public buildings and institutions, religious, charitable, &c. of Limerick, with their officials, is appended to the directory of the city at page 278.

The TRADE and COMMERCE of Limerick are very extensive. Vessels of eight hundred tons can lie within four miles of the city, and those of three hundred tons can discharge their cargoes at the quays. The imports are very large and various, consisting principally of timber, coal, salt, sugar, tallow, tobacco, soap, iron, sulphur, pitch, tar, hemp, teas, wines, dye-stuffs, &c. The number of vessels inwards, with cargoes, in the year ending December 31st, 1844, was 508, and their registered tonnage 66,616 tons. Imports estimated at 53,000 tons annually, and £350,000. value. The gross produce of the customs duties, in 1843, was £155,335. The exports in the year ending 1st Sept. 1844, were—

The number of vessels with cargoes was four hundred and sixty-one. Annual estimated value of exports £800,000. About a mile distant from the city, the vessels anchor in the Pool, from which is a most delightful view, very deservedly admired by strangers. On one side is seen the new town, with the Bishop's and the Earl of Limerick's gardens close to the river, and on the other a number of villas belonging to the wealthy citizens, and a full front view of the city, the whole forming an interesting panoramic picture. The mayor is admiral of the port, with jurisdiction from the sea to three miles above the city. The domestic trade of Limerick, carried on by the shopkeepers, is extensive—the shops are handsome, and their stocks comprise articles of fashion, necessity, and luxury. The linen and woollen manufacture has almost disappeared, but has been succeeded, within the last twelve years, by the lace manufacture, which has become famous throughout the United Kingdom for its beauty and elegance, and in which a vast number of the young female population is employed. Limerick has also been famous for its beautiful gloves for nearly a century; and it has lately established an extensive manufacture in brushes, which are sent in large quantities to the English market. The Bank of Ireland, the Provincial Bank of Ireland, and the National Bank, have each a branch here, and there are numerous assurance agencies. The hotels, of which there are many, are of the first grade. Two newspapers are published weekly—the 'Limerick Chronicle' and the 'Limerick Reporter'; they are talented journals, and, as such, are well supported by their respective subscribers.

The early municipal consequence of Limerick has already been noticed—its corporation existed both by prescription and charter. The city received privileges, franchises, and charters, from the early date of 1199, when John, Earl of Morton, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, granted it various rights and 'free customs' down to the reign of James II. The provisions in the charter conferred by that monarch remained in force until the act of the 4th of George IV, called the 'Limerick Regulation Act,' partially remodelled the powers of the corporation. The corporate body—styled the 'mayor, sheriffs, and citizens of Limerick,' consists of ten aldermen and thirty councillors, elected from out of the five wards into which the city is divided, under the provisions of the late act. The corporation holds a court of pleas of debt to any amount, and a court of conscience for adjudicating claims under 40s. The assizes for the county, and county of the city, are held twice a year by the judges for the Munster circuit and the mayor; the court of quarter sessions is held before the mayor, recorder, and other justices, and petty sessions twice a week, before the mayor and some of the civic magistrates. The assistant barrister for the county sits twice a year for the trial of civil bill cases. The city returned two members to the Irish Parliament, and so it continues to be represented in the Imperial Parliament—the gentlemen at present sitting are John O'Brien, of Cargnelly, Clare, Esquire, and James Kelly, of Errina House, Castle Connell, Esquire. The members for the county are given at page 149. The 'Limerick Bridge Com-

missioners' have the controul and regulation of the harbour, and have much improved the port by extension of the quays, &c.; but the great *desideratum* of docks for the shipping is not as yet supplied. The commissioners are entitled by their act of incorporation to levy tolls on all shipping frequenting the port, likewise on all imports and exports, and they realize a revenue, from these and other sources, of more than £4,500. per annum.

The See of Limerick was united to that of Ardfert and Aghadoe, or rather, the latter was added to the former in the year 1660. The churches in Limerick are not remarkable for external beauty. Saint Mary's, or the Cathedral, is entirely of the ancient Gothic, and may be admired for its noble simplicity, but is distinguished by a tower, one hundred and twenty feet high. There are seventeen arches in the aisles and choir, besides the great eastern window, under which the high altar was placed before the Reformation. The bishop's throne, and the stalls of the dignitaries, exhibit some curious carved work, and at the communion table is a handsome Gothic screen. Besides this there are five other Protestant churches, four Roman Catholic chapels, three friaries, and a nunnery. One of these, called the Dominican Convent and Chapel, is deserving of notice: it is a very handsome building, in the Gothic style, and was erected by the exertions of the Rev. Joseph Harrigan, then prior, in the year 1815. The Augustinian chapel, George-street, once a theatre, is very elegantly embellished, and a fine scriptural painting adorns the altar; it is also furnished with a good organ. The charitable institutions in Limerick are numerous and extremely well conducted, particularly in the medical and surgical departments. The Infirmary, Fever and Lock Hospitals; the Magdalene and Lunatic Asylums; the House of Industry, and Foundling Hospital, are prominent features of benevolence. The 'Limerick Institution,' founded in 1809, for promoting and sustaining literature and science, is supported entirely by voluntary subscriptions. The library contains four thousand volumes, embracing classical and scientific literature, and the various reviews and other periodicals. Connected with the institution is a museum, and there are spacious reading rooms, furnished with the principal journals. Lectures are delivered by professors of eminence and celebrity, to which the admission is gratuitous. This city also abounds in institutions for the instruction of the poor, which will all be found particularized in the list of 'Academies and Schools,' page 271. The markets, which are held on Wednesday and Saturday, are abundantly supplied with all the necessities of life, and at remarkably reasonable prices. Fairs Tuesday in Easter week, July 4th, August 4th, and December 12th. There is a privilege annexed to the August fair—namely, that no person can be arrested within the precincts of the liberties, on any process issuing out of the tholsel of Limerick, for the space of fifteen days. The population of the several parishes, collectively within and without the precincts of the city, by the parliamentary returns for 1841, was 57,755, of which number 48,391 were inhabitants within the limits of the city.

RATHKEALE,

A MARKET town and parish, in the barony of Lower Connello, county of Limerick, is 120 miles s. w. from Dublin, 53 n. n. w. from Cork, and 17 s. w. by w. from Limerick; situated between the last named town and Newcastle, on the banks of the river Deel. It was formerly a corporate town, and of more importance than it now is, at least in the annals of turbulence and war, having obstinately and successfully resisted various assaults of the English army during the rebellion, which desolated this island in the reign of Elizabeth. At a very early age a priory for Augustinian canons, under the invocation of the Virgin Mary, was founded here by a person of the name of Harvey. The town consists principally of one long and wide street, extending from east to west, with some respectable houses and a few good shops. The court-house, in the Square, is a neat stone building, and the bridewell, a substantial one, beneath it. Petty sessions are held every alternate Thursday, and quarter sessions in January, April, July, and October. Agriculture is the prevailing occupation of the inhabitants: the trade of the town is entirely of a character connected therewith, corn being the principal, but even that comparatively trifling; there

are two flour mills, one of which is on a large scale. The places of worship are the established church, dedicated to the Holy Trinity, erected upon an acclivity at the west end of the town, and a Roman Catholic chapel, in Thomas-street, both handsome structures: the former has a lofty embattled tower with crocketed pinnacles. The surrounding country is highly interesting, presenting a number of rich and varied prospects, embellished with flourishing plantations and many seats of the gentry. A prominent object in the landscape is Matras or Matrix Castle, which stands about a mile from the town, in a fine situation, on the banks of the Deel, commanding extensive views of the country, including the Shannon river, and the Clare and Tipperary mountains. It was besieged by Cromwell, but received little injury at his hands, and within these few years it has been put in a state of complete repair. The markets, which are well supplied, are held on Thursday and Saturday. Fairs January 6th, February 7th, March 10th, April 4th, June 19th, July 17th, August 25th, September 18th, October 14th, and November 18th. The population of the parish, in 1841, was 8,293, inclusive of 4,201 inhabitants of the town.

**ROSCREA,**

**A**N ancient and considerable market town and parish,  
partly in the baronies of Clonlisk and Ballybritt, King's  
county, and province of Leinster, but chiefly in the  
barony of Iukerrin, county of Tipperary, is 75 miles  
s.w. from Dublin, 51 N. from Clonmel, and 44 N. E. from  
Limerick; situated at a northern apex of the county  
of Tipperary, that runs up between and divides King's  
and Queen's counties. This place was erected into a  
bishopric in the year 620, by Saint Cronan; but in the  
twelfth century was united to Killaloe. Some remains  
of the cathedral may be seen in the west front of the

old church, executed in the beautiful style of the ninth  
century. Near it is a large stone cross called the Shrine  
of Saint Cronan, as well as one of the largest round  
towers in the kingdom, built of square stones, and in  
excellent preservation. Near this town the Danes met  
their first signal defeat; they had marched from Lime-  
rick and Connaught to surprise the inhabitants, then  
assembled at the great annual fair of Roscrea, which  
held fourteen days; but the people had notice of their  
approach, marched out, overthrew them, and left 4,000  
Danes dead on the field, amongst whom was Olfin, th
