DEATH OF CAPTAIN W. WHITE.

We record with sincere regret the death of Captain W. White, Scottish Rifles, third son of the late Mr. John White, D.L., Nanteman, Co. Limerick. Captain White had been on active service all through the war, and on many occasions displayed great dash and bravery. He was at Spoin Kop, and had been some time attached to the mounted Infantry in connection with despatch duty. Some three weeks ago he rode right into an ambush when he was severely wounded. He was afterwards reported among the missing, but on Tuesday a communication received from the War Office conveyed the sad tidings of his death. Captain White was most popular in his native county and the cutting short of such a bright career is deeply deplored. The County Limerick Point-to-Point Races which were to have been held at Luskennett on Monday next, have been postponed as a mark of respect to the young gentleman's memory.

FASHIONABLE WEDDING.

On the 6th April, at Coolock Church, Co. Dublin, the marriage took place of Malcolm Seton, Esq., of the India Office, London, and Miss Eveleen Bruce, daughter of the late John Bruce, Esq., of Miltown Castle, Charleville, Co. Cork. The ceremony was performed by the Very Reverend the Dean of Cork, cousin of the bride, assisted by the Rev. George Toombe, rector of the parish. The church was prettily decorated with white flowers and evergreens. The bride wore pearl-white satin—the bodice folled and softly draped with lace and chiffon. A large spray of orange blossoms covered the front of the corsage, and a sash fringed with the same blossoms fell to the feet in front over a perfectly plain trained skirt. A wreath of orange blossom and tulle veil completed the costume.

The bridesmaids were—Miss Bruce, sister, and Miss Franks, friend of the bride; Miss Ellen Dickson and Miss Magdalene Seton, cousins of the bridegroom. They wore dresses of pink bengaline trimmed with creamy guipure lace and clusters of pink noisette roses. Wreaths of the same roses were worn in the hair, and each carried a bouquet of white flowers tied with pink ribbons which, like the bride's bouquet, were the gifts of the bridegroom.

The bride was given away by her uncle, Colonel Hussey de Burch, who lent his house for the wedding. Mr. O. Harrison acted as best man, and the groomsmen were Mr. Macara Finnie, Mr. Walter Dickson, and Mr. J. Tennant.

THE KING'S TEST DECLARATION.

Sir—Before Mr. Vance took the trouble to ventilate in public his rather crude opinions on the subject, he should have read in this month's *Nineteenth Century* Sir George Sheraton Baker's very sensible article on the "King's Test." Introducing controversial and theological quibbles into a matter of simple good taste and public policy is very much beside the question at issue. It is very much to be regretted that in this 20th century that the King should commence his reign by publicly and officially insulting his Catholic sub-
